The Press Endorses. . .

Voluntary Retraction

The Torrance Press VOLUNTARILY retracts statements made in the first six paragraphs of an advertisement appearing on Page A-10 of the April 4 edition referring to the council record of Willys Blount, candidate for mayor of Torrance.

This item was placed as paid political advertising by incumbent Mayor Albert Isen and a special committee which sponsored the ad.

The Torrance Press has always tried to remain within the bounds of good taste in both its editorial and advertising material.

LAST MINUTE BULLETIN

Mayor Albert Isen, contacted by the Press yesterday noon, said that he had been served and intended to file a counter suit.

He said that he had instructed his attorneys to draw up the necessary papers and that he would bring suit for libel against Councilman Willys Blount. He stated that he would demand damages of \$1,000,000.

Also Names Group Which Sponsored Ad

Councilman Willys Blount, incensed at some "highly derogatory" statements against himself which were published in paid political advertisements, Friday filed suit for a half-million dollars against incumbent Mayor Albert Isen and the committee which allegedly sponsored the ads.

Blount also demanded retractions from the three newspapers which carried the advertisements.

Blount said that he had intended to have the papers served on the mayor and the other defendants Friday night but that he had been unable to get in touch with Isen.

Advertisement, which was published Wednesday in both of Torrance's commu-

nity papers and in an out-of-town daily, was sponsored by an organization called the "City-Wide Committee to Re-elect Mayor Albert Isen."

Advertisement was also signed "Chairman, Jack Phillips" and "Secretary, Polly Watts." The two alleged signers were also listed in the suit.

Suit was filed in Inglewood Superior Court. Attorney Charlton A. Mewborn will represent Blount.



ROSS SCIARROTTA—Outstanding educator, world traveler, and authority on governmental affairs, Sciarrotta would be a breath of fresh air on the Torrance city council. He is a firm believer in removal or fencing of dumps and dangerous pitfalls within the city. FOUR MEASURES . . .

Press Lists Stand
On Special Issues

In addition to the 40 candidates for public office which will be listed on the ballot Tuesday, voters will also be asked to decide on four special measures.

In the first measure, a proposal to issue revenue bonds, totaling \$1,225,000 for the purpose of acquisition, construction and financing additions to the Torrance Municipal Airport, the Torrance Press finds itself in unanimous support.

The fact that these are REVENUE bonds, which are required to pay themselves off from increased revenue from the airport, are the deciding factor. Always tax conscious, the Press would not endorse a measure of this sort that would hike the tax load.

Measure number two, which provides that money in the city's "Airport Fund" be used for the payment of principal and interest on the revenue bonds, we also favor as a logical and sound follow-through of the first measure.

'LAME DUCK'

Measure number three, an amendment to the charter which would allow newly elected members of the Board of Education to take office shortly after election, the Press has long favored.

This will eliminate the "lame duck" session on the board and will also eliminate possibility of defeated incumbents holding the office for several months before the successful candidate takes over.

Measure number four, a charter amendment which would provide for a continuance of the existing civil service system covering city employees, and which, by a five-sevenths vote, of the city council plus consideration by the civil service commission, allow the council to amend any provisions governing civil service, we must disapprove.

We feel that this measure would place too much power in the hands of the council and would be destructive to good government.
