Richard E. Purcell, seaman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar W. Purcell of 22102 Archibald Ave., Torrance is serving aboard the guided missile destroyer USS Towers, which participated in Exercise Pot Shot off the coast of Southern California, March 12-23.

The exercise, largest Navy training maneuver in the Pacific Fleet in nearly a year, involved more than 60 ships, many aircraft and elements of the First Marine Division and the Third Marine Air Wing.

Pot Shot was scheduled to include carrier strikes, anti-submarine operations, amphibious landings, replenishment at sea, mine warfare, naval convoy operations, Marine operations ashore and aerial, surface and sub-surface reconnaissance.

"The opportunity to bring together all these forces in a single operation is rare," says Vice Adm. Charles L. Melson, commander of the First Fleet and exercise commander. "We hope to considerably enhance the operational readiness and capabilities of all Pacific Fleet units participating."

Plans officer in the command's Transportation Section, Captain Lenassi entered the Army in October 1951 and arrived overseas, on this tour of duty, in August 1961.


The 30-year-old captain is a 1949 graduate of Lane Technical High School, Chicago, Ill. He attended the University of Illinois, Champaign.

From Minutes of the City Council and Public Knowledge

INCUMBENT -- ALBERT ISEN

- HAS CONDUCTED over 400 council meetings courteously and efficiently, streamlining procedures and eliminating red tape.
- ENDED "STAR CHAMBER" MEETINGS, welcomed and encouraged residents to attend and be heard. Freedom of speech has been a fact not a political phrase.

- FOUGHT TO MAINTAIN a fair balance between industrial and residential zoning and to prevent "land grabs" of valuable industrial land; INITIATED and assisted in successful REFERENDUM to block rezoning of Marble Tract, thereby saving valuable land for industry and more jobs, and safeguarding against high tax rise.
- ESTABLISHED annual JUNIOR CITIZENS' DAY, ARMED FORCES DAY and AIRPORT DAY in Torrance.
- ESTABLISHED Civil Defense and Disaster Commission.
- ESTABLISHED Traffic Safety Council.
- LED successful drive to locate SOUTHWEST DISTRICT SUPERIOR COURT in Torrance. The Board of Supervisors of L.A. County by RESOLUTION stated "... has given inspiration and guidance ... has given inspiration and direction for the success of this project."

OPPONENT -- BLOUNT

- HAS BEEN RUDE, UNCIVIL and DISCOURTEOUS to associates and to persons in the audience during council meetings.
