The Torrance Recreation Department yesterday announced that registrations for all swim classes of the 1962 Summer Swim Program will be taken at the "Registration Open House" Wednesday, May 23, through Saturday, May 26, at the Victor E. Benstead Plunge, 3331 Torrance Blvd. Times for registering are 2 to 8 p.m. on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and 9 a.m. to 12 noon on Saturday.

All swim instruction is free, the fee charged is a pool use fee equal to the admissions.

The "Learn to Swim Campaign" for children 7 to 12 years will begin June 18. There will be six two week sessions: June 18 to 29, July 2 to 13, July 16 to 27, July 30 to Aug. 10, Aug. 13 to 24 and Aug. 27 to Sept. 7. Classes will meet daily Monday through Friday for the two week period. Class times are 9 a.m., 10 a.m., and 11 a.m. The pool use charge for the 10 lessons is \$2.

El Camino College's horse-hiders managed to knock off loop leaders Bakersfield and Long Beach last week, but when it came to the last team in the Metropolitan Conference triumvirate, the Tribe fell flat on its face.

Friday in the last '62 Metro battle of the season for the Warriors, invading San Diego handed El Camino a monumental 19-3 defeat. The game, called the worst in El Camino history" by the Tribe tutor Chuck Freeman, was called after seven innings, when El Camino threw in the towel.

El Camino's best hurlers saw duty in the shortened contest, and not one looked good.

Jerry Smith started on the hill for the Tribe. Three innings, four hits, four walks, three errors and four runs later, Freeman sent out the hook and brought on ace John Torok. Torok, playing a rare role as a fireman, didn't fare any better. San Diego knocked him out in two stanzas flat as seven more runs came in for the visitors.

Dick King followed Torok and lasted a single inning allowing six runs, all earned. Ted Sprague received the nod as anchor man and got off easy as a tired San Diego squad scored only two runs to lead 19-0.

San Diego's charity allowed El Camino to score three runs in the seventh innings as the Tribe went daffy from the beating.

The game was called after seven innings by agreement.

First series of tennis lessons for adults and children eight years and older will be held as follows:

Torrance High School Courts: Monday and Wednesday 1 to 3 p.m., July 2 to 18, boys and girls 8 to 18 years of age.

El Retiro Park, 126 Vista del Parque: Tuesday and Thursday 1 to 3 p.m., July 3 to 19, ages 8 to 18 years.

South High School Courts: Monday and Wednesday July 2 to 18, 1 to 6 p.m. ages 8 to 18, 6 to 8 p.m. adults.
