New Tax Office To Open Tuesday

TORRANCE — New offices for the Internal Revenue Service open officially here Tuesday, centralizing business now being conducted in three locations.

Construction of facilities is part of the increased attention being placed on taxpayer service, according to Robert A. Riddell, director of the Los Angeles Internal Revenue District.

The new facility is at 20355 S. Hawthorne Blvd. Its telephone number is 370-3611.

Riddell said offices in Inglewood and San Pedro were closed Aug. 29, and business handled by those offices has been transferred to Torrance.

He said the Torrance office has a semi-automatic telephone system with a full-time switchboard operator to speed handling of taxpayer calls.

"The office force will con-

sist of revenue agents, revenue officers, tax auditors and examiners, as well as clerical and supervisory personnel" said Riddell.

An "Open House" ceremony will be held at the new office site at 10 a.m. on Tuesday.

City Manager Wade Peebles and other city dignitaries will be present.

Registrars Stationed in Wide Area

More than 4,200 deputy registrars of voters, largest number in Los Angeles County history, are stationed throughout the county as part of the "Register to Vote Month" campaign by the Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor Burton W. Chace said the number of deputy registrars has been increased within the last month by Registrar Benjamin S. Hite in an all-out effort to assure adequate registration services.

Deputies will be found in a variety of public places, Chace said, including lobbies of banks, city halls, post offices, other government buildings, markets and on street corners in the 74 cities of the county.

Chace urges eligible citizens to register as early as possible. Sept. 13 is the final day on which any person may register to vote in the Nov. 6 general election.

Asian Flu Outbreak Seen In Coming Winter Months

Asian flu will strike again this winter, the U.S. Government warns. The flu is always a serious illness, with after effects sometimes lasting many weeks. The flu also sets up victims for other ailments, such as pneumonia.

Flu is a menace to everybody. But it is particularly dangerous for certain people, some of whom may even die of the flu or its complications. These people should be vaccinated against influenza.

Those for whom influenza is a particularly perilous disease are:

Persons with rheumatic heart disease or other blood vessel or heart ailments.

Patients with chronic bronchial or lung disease such as bronchitis, asthma, emphysema, tuberculosis.

Diabetics. Sufferers from Addison's disease, a malfunctioning of the adrenal glands.

Pregnant women.

Everybody over 45.

The public health service also recommends vaccination for those whose occupations are essential to public welfare. This would include doctors and nurses and those involved with public safety, public utilities, transportation, education and communication.

The vaccine is usually given in two doses, anywhere from two weeks to one from two weeks to two months apart. After one set of shots, a yearly booster is

needed.

If you are on the list, it would be wise to consult your doctor right away about the need for first vaccination or a booster shot as the case may be.

Even if you aren't on the list but would like a flu-free winter, ask your doctor about vaccination.

Board Approves School Overpass

The board's support was the final action necessary for the project to proceed.

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
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
