Temple Conducts Morning Service

Temple Menorah of the South Bay, the largest and oldest Jewish congregation serving the South Bay-Peninsula area, will be the first congregation in the area to hold regular Sabbath morning services as well as Friday evening services, according to Dr. Morris Rockenmacher, chairman of the religious practices committee of the Temple.

Temple Menorah, located 1101 Camino Real Redondo Beach, was consecrated in 1947 and affiliated that year with the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. The congregation was begun through the labors of Anna and the late Isaac H. Cran-

cell, of Redondo Beach. From a handful of families the congregation has grown to over 300 member families drawn from San Pedro and Gardena, Inglewood and Holly Park as well as the Peninsula-South Bay communities. Myer Alpert of Palos Verdes Estates is the president of the congregation.

Sabbath services are conducted by Rabbi Henri E. Front, spiritual leader of the Temple and assisted by Harry Newman, Cantor. A choir made up of members of the congregation is led by Fay Newman, organist.

Services begin at 8:30 p.m. every Friday evening throughout the year. Saturday morning services commence at 11 o'clock. An Oneg Shabbat (reception) follows the Friday evening service. A Kiddush concludes the Saturday morning worship. All members of the Jewish faith are invited to share in the service. Visitors from the community are welcome at all times.


