Woman Named Drive Chairman

Mrs. Lloyd Carson, 21509 Howard St., Torrance, has been appointed Torrance City Chairman for the 1962 March for Muscular Dystrophy.

In announcing the chairmanship, Vin Scully, MDA County Campaign Chairman, said:

"The local drive, to be held Dec. 1 and 2, will seek to raise funds to aid nearly a quarter million sufferers of the disease.

"Seven out of ten of the victims are small children in whom the disease is usually fatal. These funds will help support two MD clinics in Los Angeles County; the patient service program in the South Bay; and seven research projects being conducted at UCLA.

"I urgently ask all the people of Torrance to join with us in the fight against this dread disease."
