Harbor City Youth Wins Safety Prize

Nathan Smith, 26426 Ozone Ave., Harbor City has been named winner of the \$150 first prize in the Highway Contest sponsored by the Wilmington-San Pedro Insurance Assn.

Presentation of the award was made at the awards assembly of Harbor College by Denver Bullock, president of the insurance association.

Runners-up in the contest are Dauna Diehl, 2071 Elanita Drive, San Pedro, and Irene May Kelly of 26737 Silver Spring Drive, Rolling Hills.

Smith's essay, "a Good Defense—The Best Offense," blamed the fact that drivers under 25 years of age, while accounting for 14 percent of the population are responsible for 27 percent of the accidents, on poor driving habits that people lapse into.

Smith suggests that drivers develop the art of defensive driving based on two concepts: first, the majority of accidents are preventable; second, by avoiding accident-provoking situations and heeding warning signs, the dangers of accidents can be lessened.
