

The Tom Spradlings picked a winner in selecting the Fairbrook model as their new Palo del Amo home.


Well on its way to a sweep Southland home honors, it has been selected as the model Balanced Power home to be featured at the 1963 Los Angeles Home Show.

Arbor Day Is 90 This Year; Dedicated to Planting Trees

Arbor Day, first observed more than 90 years ago in Nebraska, is an annual event in nearly every state. It is dedicated to the conservation of existing trees and the planting of new ones.

In California, Arbor Day is March 7, the birthday of famous horticulturist Luther Burbank. Many communities and organizations observe the day by planting street and park trees or by re-planting a damaged forest land. Others let the day slip by unnoticed because not enough people get together to do something about it.

Many neighborhoods are not as attractive as they could be with street trees. This is a project which many cities carry out through a special department. Many more are beautified with street trees only if homeowners start the ball rolling in this direction.

The basis of a beautiful street tree planting is uniformity, which means that neighborhoods will have to agree to planting a particular variety. Where the city does the planting, a choice of variety is offered by a city official.

Otherwise the best bet is to consult with a local nurseryman. Narrow his list down to three or four—including at least one flowering tree—then find out which wins most support.

Trees serve several purposes in the landscape other than adorning streets, and Arbor Day gives a good excuse to study the uses.

Some are planted because they are ornamental. Flowering fruit trees such as flowering peaches and cherries are good examples of strictly ornamental trees, though some peaches are

Q and A on Income Tax

Question: When and where should I file my State personal income tax return?

Answer: If your return is based on calendar year 1962, it must be filed no later than April 15.

Some taxpayers keep books on a fiscal year basis. If you are one of these taxpayers, your return must be filed by the 15th day of the fourth month following the close of your taxable year.

Remember: The law imposes penalties and interest for failing to file a return by the deadline.

You may personally file your return and pay your tax at any of the 13 Franchise Tax Board offices located throughout California. But it is suggested that you mail your return, along with whatever tax may be due, directly to the main office of the Franchise Tax Board at 1025 P. Street, Sacramento 14, California.

A GARDEN FOR GOURMETS

The world's happiest gardeners are probably those who grow their own vegetables and herbs.

With only an apartment window box, you can sample some of this pleasure. With a plot 10 by 15 feet or better you can really indulge yourself. A local nurseryman will help you plan a vegetable garden and start off on the right foot. Unless you know local adaptability of various vegetables, a nurseryman's advice is essential.

Radishes, turnips, squash and corn are best grown from seed. Lettuce and celery may be purchased as flat-grown seedlings in your local nursery. These are transplanted easily to the garden. One definite advantage is that you can avoid having to seed and thin the new planting.

Vegetables best grown from seed include beans, peas, beets, carrots, chard, cucumber, parsley, corn, squash and radishes. Those available as seeding transplants include tomatoes, peppers, egg plant, celery, broccoli, brussels sprouts, cabbage and cauliflower. Some of these latter are cool season crops and may not be available in all areas. Let-

ture in several varieties is available in nursery flats. Onions may be started from seed or from onion sets. For small green onions, sets are usually recommended since they are faster. Seed is the cheaper method, sets are more convenient.

As for herbs, most favorite varieties are available in nurseries already started, or you can grow any of them from seed. A basic list of herbs should include basil, rosemary, thyme, oregano, marjoram and chives. They may be grown in the ground or in pots. The latter method makes them a possibility for gardeners who live in city apartments and lack ground space.

The herb garden should be as close as possible to the kitchen, enabling you to take a pinch of this or that while cooking. Most herbs take up little space and present no problem.

Many vegetables should be planted now. Heat lovers such as tomatoes, egg plant and peppers, should not go in until weather warms up. April usually is the recommended month for planting, except in the north coastal area, where May is better.

For those who never know how much of any vegetable to plant, the following recommendations will be helpful. They cover the favorite vegetables and apply to a family of four. Beans (15 foot row); peas (30 foot row); summer squash (3 plants); tomatoes (15 plants); onions (30 foot row); corn (four 7 foot rows); lettuce (15 foot
