

Women's Clubs Slate Marina District Convention in April

The annual Convention of Marina District 18, California Federation Women's Clubs will be held at the Hotel Miramar in Santa Monica, April 24, 25 and 26.

Club presidents and district chairmen will be honored at the "Strengthen the Arm of Liberty" banquet on Thursday evening at which time Art, Membership, Music, Motion Picture, Radio and Television awards will be given. Other awards will be presented at the luncheon on Friday, April 26.

Registration will be followed by the "Open House" in the Presidents suite from 7 to 9 p.m. Opportunity will also be given for registration beginning at 8 a.m. Thursday, April 25.

The day's program will open with the president's call to order and the Opening Ceremonies conducted by Mrs. Ervin W. Graf, president, followed by a panel of club presidents with Mrs. A. Ben Ellery as moderator.

Special music will be provided by the College Singers from the Santa Monica City College directed by Dr. S. Anthony Viggiano.

Speaker for the meeting is Mrs. Edwin F. Bryant vice president of C.F.W.C. Her topic is "Our Opportunities." Mrs. Bryant has been active in club work since 1930 having served on the State board for seven years, 12 years on district boards and seven years in Riverside County Board.

Mrs. Bryant is a graduate of Stanford University and has had graduate work at Heidelberg University. She has been state chairman of literature and drama. For the district board she has been chairman of narcotics, youth conservation, education, religion and children and youth. She has been a teacher, had her own radio program, and has worked in several fields of community service.

The banquet is scheduled to be held in the Satellite Room, Thursday evening at 7 p.m. W. J. Teague, vice president of Pepperdine College will speak on "The Basic Strength of Capitalism."

Teague is a graduate of Abilene and Columbia University in New York City. His background includes a job as Sportscaster and much time spent in Citizenship and Church work. He will speak on "The Basic Strength of Capitalism."

Music for the banquet will be furnished by winners of the 1963 Music Scholarships. Students include Tom Pierson, Pianist of Palisades High School; Mary Ann Lacatos, Cellist Santa Monica High School; Carol Neblett, Vocalist from Redondo High School and Robert Ballanti, Oboist from Venice High School.

Club presidents and departmental chairmen will receive awards for the year's achievements.

Friday morning's session will convene at 9:45 a.m. Speaker of the morning will be Mrs. C. E. Mitchell, California History and Landmarks chairman, C.F.W.C. Her subject will be "Take a Giant Step Backward." Mrs. Mitchell was born in California and has lived here all her life. She has been interested in many phases of Club work. Besides having been a free lance writer for national magazines, Mrs. Mitchell served as state chairman of Gardens and City Beautification Department, Founding chairman of "Ontario City Beautiful," a municipal improvement organization, she became that group's president. She has been active in church and the PTA. Mrs. Mitchell is a member of the National Association of Parliamentarians and a past president of the first Toastmistress Club in California.

The Marina District Chorus will be directed by Mrs. J. Alan Brooks.

Luncheon will be in the Satellite Room at 11:45 p.m. and will conclude with the remaining departmental awards.

ISOLETTE PRESENTED TO HOSPITAL NURSERY

The Women's Auxiliary of Little Company of Mary Hospital announces the presentation of an Isolette to the hospital's maternity department. Mother M. Patricia, administrator of the hospital stated that the equipment purchased by the women's auxiliary is the fifth Isolette to be added to the maternity facilities of the hospital.

A specially constructed incubator unit for newborn infants, the Isolette completely encloses the infant and is constructed of transparent plastic to enable the nurses to observe the infant at all times. Inside the unit, temperature, humidity, and oxygen concentration are carefully controlled. There are special access holes in the plastic enclosure to permit the nurses to care for the infant without removing the environment made possible by the unit.

The Isolette is used for many purposes in the care of newborns, including the supply of additional warmth, and atmosphere of controlled moisture content, providing additional oxygen when necessary, and isolating the baby from exposure to other individuals.

Mother Patricia thanked the auxiliary for their efforts in helping develop the hospital's outstanding obstetrical department. The Isolette is valued at approximately eleven hundred dollars.

Rabbi Is Slated to Receive Hebrew Doctorate Degree

Rabbi Henri E. Front, spiritual leader of Temple Menorah of Redondo Beach, has earned a doctorate at the California School of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion.

The degree, Doctor of Hebrew Letters, will be awarded at a Sabbath Service at the Wilshire Blvd. Temple on Friday night, June 14, at 8:15 p.m.

This doctorate, the only one to be awarded by the California School this year, will be given as part of the graduation exercises of the school which is the third of four branches of the world's oldest Rabbinical Academy.

Rabbi Front, who is past president of the South Bay Ministerial Association, came to Temple Menorah in July, 1957 after serving two years as a Navy Chaplain with the United States Marine Corps on Okinawa. He had been ordained at the Cincinnati School of the HUC-JIR, serving as president of the senior class of 1955.

His dissertation was "The Problem of Evil in the Midrash Rabah." The Midrash Rabah is a five volume work of Rabbinical commentary on the Rive Books of Moses, written in the first seven centuries of this era. His study included examination of Gora - astrianism, Gnosticism, Greek philosophy and Christianity.
