Spring Music Festival Set Thursday at North Hi Gym

Eight elementary school choruses participated in North High School's first elementary vocal music festival, according to Daniel Walker, music director.

More than 600 students from Carr, Lincoln, Arlington, Crenshaw, Hamilton, Madison, Yukon and Magruder were evaluated in three categories—grades 4 to 6, grades 7 to 8, grades 4 to 8.

Winning in the first group was Carr Elementary School under the direction of Mrs. Alice Babbitt; in the second group, Carr Elementary under the direction of Mrs. Ruth Broutigam; and Lincoln Elementary, under the direction of Mrs. Barbara Booth, in the third group.

All elementary choruses participating in the festival will combine with North High's vocal and instrumental departments, for a total of 900 performing musicians tomorrow at North High's annual Spring Music Festival.

The three outstanding elementary choruses will sing their own individual selections. The other elementary school choruses will sing two mass choral numbers.

The program will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the high school gym.

Seating capacity will be limited to 1,200 adults on a first-come, first-served basis, school authorities cautioned. A large, perhaps capacity, turnout is expected because of the large number of schools and performers involved in the program.

School Offers Spanish Class for Children

The sounds of Spain in elementary Spanish classes, followed by songs, games and dances, will be heard daily at Marymount College this summer when children will take part in the Casa Espanola conducted by the Marymount Spanish Institute for six weeks beginning on Monday, June 24.

Two hourly demonstration classes are scheduled for the session. Spanish for Children at 9:30 a.m. will be taught by Mrs. Blanca Castelan Decaen, who received her master of arts degree at UCLA and is a member of the teacher training program in the Los Angeles school system.

She also attended the National Defense Education Act Institute for native Spanish speakers at the University of Texas.

Spanish songs, games and dances are scheduled for 10:30 with Mrs. Romana Hilda Espinosa de Evans as instructor. A graduate of the University of Mexico, she is a Ph.D. candidate at UCLA.

Fee for both classes, open to all children of elementary level, will be \$25.

Dr. Magda Lempart of the Marymount College foreign language department is supervisor of the Spanish Institute, which is open to teachers and students of Spanish.

WORLD TRADE CENTER PLANS AIRPORT BRANCH

The Los Angeles World Trade Center, with headquarters on Terminal Island, will also have branch facilities at Los Angeles International Airport and at the newly-proposed International Square development in downtown Los Angeles.

Groundbreaking for the Terminal Island main complex will occur in October on a section of Reeves Field at the approach to the new Vincent Thomas Bridge.

The Los Angeles World Trade Center Corporation has already submitted a request for a ground lease at the old terminal of Los Angeles International Airport in the area where a major freight air terminal is being developed by the City of Los Angeles.

International Square, to be constructed in the downtown Los Angeles business district, will offer a many-faceted program, including facilities for the world trade center, transportation center, office buildings and a deluxe hotel-motel group.

An attractive and modern building will be constructed at the airport, in keeping with the architecture of the Center at Terminal Island. Although freight rates by air are generally higher than those by water, importers and exporters have found that in certain cases, the higher rates are justified due to the big saving in time.

Noted Semanticist Slated To Give Word to Us Folks

S. I. Hayakawa, recognized authority on word meanings, will speak on "Semantic Problems in International Communications" in the El Camino College Campus Center Friday at 8:30 p.m.

Following attendance of an overflow crowd at Dr. Hayakawa's last appearance on campus, the lecture will be staged in the Women's Gym if pre-sales of tickets warrant the change to the larger facility. What Semantics Is
General Semantics is "the study of how not to be a damn fool" according to a description made by Dr. Hayakawa in a Life magazine article.

Professor of language arts at San Francisco State College, Dr. Hayakawa has lectured on semantics under the auspices of the U.S. State Department under both the Eisenbrower and Kennedy Administrations. He spoke in Japan, Germany and in the Scandinavian countries.

Searching for the many interpretations that can be given to every word, Dr. Hayakawa has concluded that "words don't mean, people mean" and that "refusal is simply a fact and does not mean rejection."

Roger Wagner Will Conduct Marymount Folk Festival

Folk songs of many nations will comprise the program when Roger Wagner, internationally known conductor, will present the annual Marymount College Spring Concert Sunday afternoon on the Palos Verdes Estates campus.

Participating will be the Marymount College Choir and the Coro Clasico de Palos Verdes with traditional songs and with selections by Monteverdi, Griffith, Schubert, Morley, Handel, Copland and Vaughn Williams.

The combined choirs will present "Let Thy Holy Presence," by Tschernokoff, "Tutu Maramba," arranged by James Erb, "When Love is Kind," English folksong, and "Simple Gifts," a Shaker folksong arranged by Aaron Copland.

Marymount singers will offer "Skip to My Lou," arranged by Allen Griffith and "There's a Hole in My Bucket," English folksong.

The Coro Clasico de Palos Verdes, consisting of choral students from the college extension division, will sing "As From the Earth a Flower Grows," by Monteverdi, "Dass Sie Hier Gewesen," Schubert, "O Sleep, Fond Fancy," Morley and "Where'er You Walk," Handel.

Following the intermission, both choirs and soloists will join in the Ralph Vaughan Williams arrangement of "Folk Songs of the Four Seasons," comprising 13 short songs based on the seasons of the year.

The concert will begin at 3 p.m. in the Student-Faculty Center, with an admission charge of \$1 for adults and 50c for students.

Prior to the program, Dr. Wagner, who heads the Marymount College music department, will conduct the Verdi "Requiem" on May 7 in Flagstaff with the Arizona Symphony and the chorus of the University of Arizona.

The club has many activities for all its members the year around.

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
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
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
