## Beer Flavors Meat Loaf

There are probably almost as many ways to make a meat loaf as there are days in the year! If you're looking for a new one, and an easy-to-prepare family supper at the same time, try this skillet meat loaf tangled with the zesty flavor of beer or ale. Either of the brewed beverages is used as the liquid ingredient, and make gravy right in the pan, along with a touch of chili sauce.

1 pound ground chuck  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1/3 cup chili sauce  
Beat egg slightly in large bowl. Add 1/3 cup of beer. Stir in bread crumbs, salt pepper, onion and thyme. Add meat and mix thoroughly. Shape into one large patty. Melt butter in skillet. Brown meat over medium heat on both sides. Add remaining 2/3 cup beer; cover and simmer 20 minutes. Stir chili sauce into pan gravy and heat to serving temperature.

Cooking the patty on top the stove keeps your kitchen cooler and enables you to serve the dish in half the time required for oven-baked meat loaf. And summer being the season everyone wants to be out of doors, this is indeed a tasty time-saver!

**Meat Loaf**  
1 egg  
1 cup beer or ale, divided  
1 cup soft bread crumbs  
3/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 teaspoon instant dried onion  
1 teaspoon thyme

Yield: 4 servings.
