## HC Enrollment Shows Increase

Fall enrollment at Harbor  
 College, with a total of 5,274  
 students, shows an increase  
 of 528 over the fall enroll-  
 ment of 1963, according to  
 William H. McMasters, assis-  
 tant dean of Admissions and  
 Guidance.  
 Day classes showed an in-  
 crease of 663 students while  
 evening classes dropped by  
 135. The total enrollment in  
 the college in 1949, first year  
 of operation, numbered only  
 583.

## 'Conference on Gambling' Scheduled in Area Church

Attorney General Thomas Lynch and the Rev. Robert Brashares, Las Vegas minister, will keynote speakers at a Methodist "Conference on

Gambling," at First Methodist Church, 812 W. 165th Place, Gardena Saturday.  
 Prime target of the meeting is defeat of Proposition 16 on the November ballot, the effort to legalize a state lottery.

Mr. Brashares, pastor of Las Vegas' First Methodist Church, has been a keen observer and outspoken critic of Las Vegas gambling and its effects on persons and society.

Through workshops and addresses the meeting will seek to underscore the threat of gambling to society, and to clarify moral and economic implications in the lottery proposal.

Open to ministers, church school teachers, youth workers, and interested laymen, leaders anticipate a full afternoon of study and discussion beginning at 2:30 p.m.

Sponsors are the Board of Christian Social Concerns and Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Southern California-Arizona Methodist Conference. The Rev. James A. King, pastor of First Methodist Church, Redondo Beach, chairman of the board's committee on temperance and general welfare, is conference chairman.
