









**Harbor GOP Club Urges 'No' on 16**

Members of the Harbor Republican Club have voted to recommend a "no" vote on propositions 15 and 16 on the Nov. 3 ballot. The club, abiding by its rules requiring a two-thirds vote to take a position, made no recommendation on Proposition 14.

The club also voted to recommend "yes" votes on propositions 3, 4, 5, 6, 11, 13, and 17.

A "no" vote was recommended on Propositions 1, 2, 7, 8 and 10. No recommendation was made on Propositions 9 and 12.

On county questions, members urged "yes" votes on Propositions A and B, and a "no" vote on the Flood Control Bond issue—Proposition C.
