



Foyt in Final Sprint Race

A. J. Foyt, the Texan who dominates American automobile racing, drives the final sprint race of his brilliant career Saturday night at Ascot Park, Gardena.

Following Saturday night's program Foyt, who has earned close to \$300,000 in prize money this year, will put his Chevy powered sprinter up for sale.

He's far from retiring from racing for he'll be back at Ascot for J. C. Agajanian's 24th annual 150-lap midget car Grand Prix on Thanksgiving night, and also no doubt in two Ascot stock car USAC sanctioned races, 100-laps Saturday night, Nov. 14, and 300-laps Sunday afternoon, Dec. 6.

Cycles Set To Race On Friday

California motorcycle racing championships will be on the line Friday night, on the scorching half-mile oval at Ascot Park, Gardena, in the final AMA program of the 1964 night speedway season.

Sammy Tanner of Long Beach and Elliott Schultz of South Gate, the sensational win twins, will settle the expert class Ascot title as well as the state championship in the feature of the night with distance upped to 20 laps by racing director J. C. Agajanian.

So, if fans want to see Foyt in a sprint race, the last chance is this Saturday night and he'll be up against his No. 1 oval track rival, Parnelli Jones of Torrance.

Not to mention five more Indianapolis drivers—Jud Larson, Roger McCluskey, Don Branson, Bud Tinglestad and Bobby Unser.

Plus such Southland swifts as Allen Heath, Colby Scroggins, Hal Minyard and Bobby Hogle to name a few.

Thirty laps is main event distance and seven more events are scheduled starting with one-lap qualifying trials at 6:30 p.m.

Fourteen fastest drivers of the evening will be flagged off in the 30-lap "main" and competition begins at 8:30 o'clock with the 3-lap trophy dash between the four quickest qualifiers starting in inverted order.

Ralph White of San Diego is defending state champion, but this time is outranked by Tanner and Schultz in the favoritism department.

All indications point to jam packed Ascot stands for Foyt's farewell to sprint car racing.

PEPPERDINE REPRESENTED IN OLYMPICS

Football Playoff Dates Announced

Supervisor of Athletics Guy Wrinkle has announced pairings, dates and locations for the 1964 Los Angeles City High School football playoffs to be held Dec. 5-12-19.

The pairings had been established by the Games Committee of the Athletic Policy Determining Committee in 1958 when it established a round robin type of rotation by which every league will play every other league in the first round of the playoffs by 1965.

Additionally, the PDC decided last spring to pre-determine locations, dates, and starting times for the games so as to eliminate involved negotiations between officials and coaches of competing schools in the playoffs.

The first-round pairings for Saturday, Dec. 5, all games starting at 1:30, are as follows:

- East Valley League vs. Marine League at East Los Angeles College.
 - West Valley League vs. Western League at Los Angeles High School.
 - Northern League vs. team-to-be-selected at L.A. Valley College.
 - Southern League vs. Eastern League at Gardena High School.
- In the semi-finals, Saturday, Dec. 12, a doubleheader will be played at East Los Angeles College, the first game starting at 12 noon.
- The winner of the East Valley-Marine game will play the winner of the West Valley-Western clash in one semi-final game; the other pits the Northern-team to be named survivor against the Southern-Eastern victor.
- Selection of the eighth team for the first round will be done in the manner used in past years—first consideration to a league with a two-way percentage tie for the championship (an undefeated tie takes precedence over a defeated tie) and a three-way percentage tie for first takes precedence over a clear-cut second place team, with a clear-cut second taking precedence over a percentage tie for second.
- If it becomes necessary to revert to the rotation of leagues for selection of a second place team, the West Valley League has first preference, with the Northern, Southern, Western, East Valley, Eastern, and Marine Leagues following, in that order.
- The Marine League used its spot on the rotation last year when Gardena and Jordan tied for first and came in to the playoffs as percentage co-champions.


