

South Bay Symphony To Mark 20th Year

Composer-conductor Elyse Aeble will direct the South Bay Civic Symphony Orchestra in the second concert of the season Friday, Nov. 20, at the Redondo Beach Union High School auditorium.

Miss Aeble, now in her 20th year as conductor of the orchestra, has selected a program honoring the 100th anniversary of Sibelius at the request of the Consul General of Finland.

Selections will include the Italian Symphony of Mendelssohn, the Overture to Oberon by von Weber, and Sibelius' Finlandia.

Amparo Iturbi, described as one of the most admirable pianists of our day, will be featured. She will play from the work of Chopin, Scar-

latti, Mendelssohn, Gershwin, and Granados.




