

Details Given Social Security Confidential

Disclosure of information provided the Federal Social Security Administration by claimants seeking benefits in the form of old-age, survivors, and disability insurance is prohibited by Section 1106 of the Social Security Act, according to Miles Davis, district manager of the Torrance office.

Board Grants Apartment Zone

An R-4 zone has been recommended by the Regional Planning Commission on property located west of Hawthorne Avenue. The property is owned by Highridge Development Co. of Palos Verdes.

The new zone, if approved by the Board of Supervisors, will permit construction of unlimited multiple residences.

Even the amount of a person's benefit and his address can be released only to a few government agencies. This may be done in connection with the payment of other benefits out of federally administered or federal-state funds, investigation of federal income tax violations, or espionage and sabotage investigation.

In some cases the Social Security Administration can release information about the amount of Social Security benefit payment at the beneficiary's request, Davis added.
