**Firm Issues Dividend for Fifth Year**

This is clean-up month in most gardens — the holidays are over and you are rested up and looking for Spring.

You should rake up all old leaves and debris under your plants. Fallen leaves, unless diseased, may be added to your compost pile.

The dormant plants and all surrounding ground area should be sprayed with a lime-sulphur and oil dormant spray to kill those overwintering insects and fungus growths.

Your dormant trees may be pruned now and it would be well for you to get an inexpensive illustrated pruning manual from your nurseryman. You will find it very easy to do your own pruning even if you are new to this business.

Do not prune your frost damaged plants. I'll have more to say on that subject next week.
