## Board Pledges Help In Farm Labor Hunt

Full cooperation with John H. Henning, Undersecretary of Labor, has been pledged by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors in finding able-bodied men now on relief for work in farm programs.

The board made the pledge on motion of Supervisor Kenneth Hahn, who said there are 175,000 unemployed men in Los Angeles County. There also are some 30,000 school dropouts in the county, he added.

He said that \$10 million could be saved annually from the relief role by putting some of these men receiving public assistance checks to work harvesting the crops.

**WITH THE** conclusion of the Bracero Program by Congress last Dec. 31, California growers face huge shortages of manpower in picking and packing such crops as lettuce, tomatoes, and citrus fruits.

Undersecretary of Labor Henning is in California to help promote the use of the available domestic manpower supply in these jobs. Strong resistance has come from growers in the Imperial Valley.

"It's a sad situation to have so many unemployed persons, willing to work, yet the large farm corporations are not willing to use Americans in the fields but want to sabotage these proposals and attempt to continue using Mexican Braceros.

"I am convinced that thousands of unemployed men are able and willing to do these jobs," Hahn added. "It is essential, however, that the large farm owners cooperate for the benefit of themselves and the taxpayers who must shoulder the large burden of paying for relief."

**IN SEPTEMBER, 1964,** Hahn initiated a program in

Los Angeles County to make public assistance recipients available to the farm owners, stipulating that they be given "decent working conditions and a living wage."

Under this program, the farmers would have to guarantee at least \$1.25 per hour, adequate sanitary conditions, and transportation to and from work areas.

Any able-bodied public assistance recipient who refused to work after being accepted by the farmers under these conditions would be dropped from the relief roles, Hahn said.

## Construction Of Fieldhouse Begins Soon

Groundbreaking ceremonies are slated early in February to launch construction of a \$81,100 fieldhouse at Harbor City Recreation Center, 24901 Frampton Ave.

The facility will have three buildings and a covered play area, all under a series of connecting roofs. There will be a general purpose room, storage area, small pantry, indoor-outdoor sanitary facilities, craft shop and director's office.

## Edison Co. To Expand In 1965

Expenditures totaling \$116.6 million are budgeted by Southern California Edison Co. for electric system additions in Los Angeles County during 1965, L. E. Jenkins, district manager, has announced.

This is the amount of money Edison has earmarked for various expansion projects and system additions to meet the mounting electrical requirements of residents and businesses within the county, Jenkins said.

Another index of the electric company's impact on the overall economy of the county, he said, is the direct payroll to employees working and living here.

Edison's wages and salaries paid in the county during 1964 totaled \$55 million. This does not include money paid by contractors and suppliers to craftsmen who are doing work related to Edison's continuing construction program in the county, he pointed out.

**THE COMPANY'S** total gross construction budget for 1965 in the 16 counties it serves in California and Nevada is expected to total \$214 million. Total estimated payroll for all Edison men and women during 1964 was \$86.9 million.

Major construction projects currently under way on the Edison system include work on the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station at Camp Pendleton and three conventional generating units. Two of these are being constructed at Alamitos steam-electric generating station, and the third is nearing completion at the company's El Segundo station.

Edison is preparing to begin construction of initial segments of two extra-high-voltage 500,000-volt transmission lines in California which the company will operate, in conjunction with Pacific Gas & Electric and San Diego Gas & Electric companies, as key links in the Pacific Northwest - Southwest power intertie, Jenkins said.

## To Serve on Commission

Supervisors Kenneth Hahn, Eugene Debs, and Warren Dorn have been reappointed to new terms on the Coliseum Commission by the Board of Supervisors.

The commission acts as a board of directors for the operations of the Los Angeles Memorial Sports Arena and the Coliseum. In addition to the three supervisors, three representatives of the state and three representatives of the City of Los Angeles are members.

## Garden Checklist


1. At the top of the list comes post-Christmas care for living Christmas trees and gift plants. Move living Christmas trees out to the deck or terrace. You can keep them in their containers for indoor use again next year. Be sure to keep Christmas plants watered. Azaleas can stand plunging into a sinkful of water occasionally — pot and all — cyclamen should be planted in the ground or set the pot and all into the ground, as soon as its decorative value is no longer needed indoors.

2. This is the time to get bareroot plants. Roses, fruit trees, flowering trees, deciduous shrubs and shade trees are all available bareroot now.

3. Check the camellias and azaleas in bloom now at your nursery to see if they're the ones you've been looking for.

4. Clean up your garden for the new year. Get rid of any fallen leaves and spent blooms and weeds that are still cluttering the ground; then get to work pruning summer and fall blooming deciduous shrubs, but not the early spring bloomers.

5. After you finish pruning, it's a good idea to go over the entire garden with a clean-up spray to control hibernating winter pests. Ask a member of the California Association of Nurserymen to recommend the exact spray for this job.
