Turnover Rate Low In Schools

Nearly eight out of nine persons employed by the Torrance Unified School District a year ago returned to their jobs this fall.

A report just released by Dr. Robert Morton, assistant superintendent of personnel, indicates that teacher turnover for the 1964-65 school totaled 11.9 per cent while turnover among non-teaching employees was 11.2 per cent. This represented a fluctuation upward of less than 1 per cent among teachers and a 5 per cent decrease among non-teaching personnel, Dr. Morton stated.

Most common reason given by teachers who quit their jobs was "inconvenient location." Other common reasons given for leaving were: home responsibilities, similar employment elsewhere, or husband's work.

"Turnover statistics are difficult to interpret," Dr. Morton said, "since there is a nationwide pattern of teachers resigning because of family and home responsibilities and returning to the profession a few years later." Seventeen teachers who previously had resigned from Torrance schools were reinstated this year, he pointed out.
