It has been a curious season and perhaps the most curious backstage story is that of "The Loner" one of the best crafted of the new programs created by Rod Serling and played by Lloyd Bridges.

It began with Serling's concept of the central character which he outlined in a slightly pretentious and highly contradictory description. But it is interesting as an example of the kind of non-sense that sells a series to sponsors and networks these days. Stand by for gritty prose:

"This is 'The Loner'—a tall man, seasoned, strengthened, made perceptive by 14 years in an Army saddle" (Whoa, there Serling!) "Not a crusader in that he will search for a cause—but sufficiently human and with that modicum of character that it takes to pick a side when a cause presents itself. He is, as dictated by the breed, a professional at arms. He is not a disciple of the gun but a proficient user."

"HE CAN LAUGH. He knows humor." (Whoever saw Lloyd Bridges laugh?) "He knows that human foibles extend to himself. But again, like his breed, there is a forbearance to the man; there is compassion; there is a deep rooted, gut-level appreciation of what is the infinite value of human life."

"This man searches for indefinable things. He is alone because privacy and independence and the right to choose are never respected by war. He has no Achilles heel. No phantom crosses borne with guilt. No complexes that twist and distort."

"If he is vague as to his hungers, it is the vagueness of the time. If he is inarticulate in his yearnings it is the same primitive language of the post-war, young nation relearning a language."

'Ability Counts' Essay Contest Deadlines Set

High school juniors and seniors in the Torrance and South Bay areas have been invited to enter the 1966 "Ability Counts" essay contest being sponsored by the Retail Torrance-South Bay Committee for Employment of the Handicapped.

Grant Young, chairman of the committee, said essays are limited to 750 words and must be on the theme "What Handicapped Workers Are Contributing to My Community." Deadline for entries is Jan. 7, 1966.

Students from North, South, Torrance, and West high schools, as well as students from Bishop Montgomery, Serra, Chadwick, and Marymount high schools are eligible to enter the contest. Redondo, Mira Costa, Aviation, Palos Verdes, and Rolling Hills juniors and seniors also are eligible.

Cancer Volunteers to Conclude 'Impossible'

The "last lap" of the six-year study of the relationship of human living habits to cancer has been launched by American Cancer Society volunteers in the Centinela Valley-South Bay District.

More than a million Americans have been participating in the marathon hunt for epidemiological clues concerning the cause and development of cancer since the search, originally branded "impossible," began in 1959.
