Law Is Analyzed

Gun Permit Valid Throughout State

Several law-enforcement officers and many men who are not peace officers have asked me to obtain an official legal opinion about the carrying of concealed weapons, especially revolvers and semi-automatic pistols. The opinion of the Legislative Counsel, dated Oct. 22, 1965, is set forth below:

"Dear Mr. Chapel: You have asked whether a license to carry a concealed weapon issued by a police chief of a city is good throughout the state.

"We are of the opinion that a license issued by a police chief of a city is valid throughout the state and the licensee need not obtain a license from each licensing authority in whose territorial jurisdiction he may carry a concealed weapon.

"Penal Code Section 12025 provides:

"12025. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, any person who carries concealed upon his person or concealed within any vehicle which is under his control or direction any pistol, revolver, or other firearm capable of being concealed upon the person without having a license to carry such firearm as provided in this chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor, and if he has been convicted previously of any felony or of any crime made punishable by this chapter, is guilty of a felony.

"Firearms carried openly in belt holsters are not concealed within the meaning of this section, nor are knives which are carried openly in sheaths suspended from the waist of the wearer."

"Penal Code Section 12050 provides:

"12050. The sheriff of a county, and the board of police commissioners, chief of police, city marshal, town marshal, or other head of the police department of any city or county, upon proof that the person applying is of good moral character, and that good cause exists for the issuance may issue to such person a license to carry concealed a pistol, revolver, or other firearm for a period of one year from the date of the license."

"Section 12025 requires only that the person have a license to carry such firearm as provided in this chapter." The chapter provides, in Section 12050, which authorities may issue licenses, the criteria for issuance, and the term of the license, but does not provide that the license shall be valid only in the territorial jurisdiction of the issuing authority. Nor does it provide that when one authority has denied a license another authority cannot grant one or that the licensee must be a resident of the city or county in which the license is issued.

"Section 12051 specifies the information that must be contained in a license application and requires that applications and licenses be uniform throughout the state. A statewide system of information collection and dissemination is provided in Section 12052, whereby the licensing authorities are required to forward fingerprints or a copy of the license application to the State Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation and to await the report of the bureau containing information it may have on the applicant before issuing the license.

"Had the Legislature desired to limit the territorial validity of a license it could have done so, as it limited the area within which a licensed retailer can sell concealable weapons under Section 12071. We find nothing in the chapter to imply that such a limitation was intended.

You Can Hydroplane In Auto Says Patrol

You don't have to ride in a motorboat to glide along like a hydroplane. Autos do it all the time when they speed along highways in a rainstorm, according to Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden of the California Highway Patrol.

The patrol calls it "tire hydroplaning," a recent scientific discovery that help to explain many a mystery crash that happens on rainy days for no apparent reason.

"A car is like a boat on wet roads," said Crittenden. "In heavy rain, the front wheels climb up on a tough film of rain, and your car hydroplanes."

A recent series of tests indicated that most tires hydroplane at 70 miles an hour. Worn tires with smooth treads will do so more quickly, even at 50 miles an hour.

"SLOW DOWN and put more air in the tires," is the advice of the patrol.

If the air pressure in a tire is increased, it narrows the tire print area on the road so that the weight of the vehicle is more concentrated and thus able to break through the surface film on the water for a better grip on the pavement.
