Mrs. Cloud's head struck the windshield of Henderson's car officers said. She was pronounced dead at Harbor General Hospital.

Imperial Bank Votes New Stock Dividend

Directors of the Imperial Bank, Western at Imperial, have voted a five per cent stock dividend and simultaneously authorized a new stock issue, George L. Graziadio Jr., president, announced yesterday.

The stock dividend will be payable Dec. 15, 1965, to shareholders of record Nov. 22, 1965," Graziadio said. "Shareholders also will be issued rights to subscribe for one new share of stock for each five shares presently held at a price of \$21 per share. The rights will expire on Jan. 5, 1966. The stock dividend will not be entitled to the subscription rights."

Graziadio said that the directors' actions reflected the sound growth and increasing earnings record of the Imperial Bank. Its financial statement as of Sept. 30, 1965, reflected total resources of \$15,938,565.59. Deposits as of that date were \$13,856,202.19 and capital accounts totaled \$1,395,847.49.

The first nine months earnings for 1965 totaled \$236,517.81 versus \$133,406.06 for the like 1964 period. The earnings gain was approximately 80 per cent. "Directors, officers and staff of the Imperial Bank are dedicated to a pattern of continuing growth and expansion through service to the entire Inglewood-South Bay area," Graziadio stated. "Our growth is somewhat impressive for a fairly new bank, and we are committed to sound, conservative growth with customer service and safety of deposits as our primary considerations."

The Imperial Bank first opened its doors for business Aug. 6, 1963.
