### Chadwick Expansion Set Soon

Plans for a long-range development program of Chadwick School in Rolling Hills were announced at the first meeting of the Council of Development last week. The program calls for the expansion of the present student body of 400 to 550.

Comprised of parents, and friends of the school, the Council of Development has been organized to implement the development program and act as an advisory council to the Board of Trustees. The program will cost approximately \$5 million over the next 10 years, with the money being divided equally between endowment and buildings.

Construction contemplated under the first phase, which should get under way in the fall, will include a new dining and student union facility, new elementary school building and a dormitory, according to Andrew Shaw, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Roesler-Chadwick Foundation which owns and operates Chadwick School.

Nineteen students at Casimir School have been named to the principal's honor roll for outstanding citizenship, according to Martin Beaudel, principal of the school.


Parents of the students received letters from Beaudel and the students were honored at a special school assembly.


