### Wing Names Chairman for Armed Forces Day Group

George S. Wing, general chairman for the Torrance Armed Forces Day celebration, has announced the appointment of committee chairmen to organize activities for the sixth annual celebration. Torrance will observe Armed Forces Day Friday and Saturday, May 14 and 15.

Lt. Col. Harold A. McKean, California State Military Reserve (CSMR), was named parade chairman. Maj. Frank Shelton, CSMR, is vice chairman for the marshaling area. Robert H. Vroman of Royale Realty was named to plan the Armed Forces Day luncheon. City Engineer Walter Noliac will head up planning for the static display, while City Clerk Vernon Coil is to be chairman for the pyrotechnical display.

BRUCE JONES, manager of the downtown branch of the Bank of America, was assistant Remelmeier. John Hales, advertising manager of the Hi-Shear Corp., was appointed publicity chairman. He will be assisted by Press-Herald publisher Glenn Pfeil, Robert L. Curry, and Dr. J. H. Hull.

Other chairmen include: Honor Morgan, public address system with Joe Doss as vice chairman; Lt. Joseph B. Miles, Torrance Police Department; traffic control, and Henry Rice, transportation chairman.

FEDERAL and state representatives named to coordinate posts for the two-day celebration include: Col. Stephen C. Monroe, coordinator for regular and reserve forces; Lt. Col. William L. Geissert, National Guard coordinator, and Richard Washburne, representing the Savings Bond division of the U. S. Treasury Department.

The executive committee will include Wing, Mayor Albert Ison and Chamber of Commerce president Arthur L. Reeves, co-chairmen; Edwin W. Sullivan, coordinator for the Chamber of Commerce, and Orin P. "Bud" Johnson, assistant city manager.

Wing said the celebration will begin Friday evening May 14, with a giant fireworks display at civic center. The parade will be held Saturday morning, May 15, and will be followed by a special luncheon.

Time is running out for veterans of both World War II and Korea to take advantage of their "no-down-payment" GI home loans. Don Leahy, sales director at Carson Estates, cautioned today.


