

New Booklet on Youth

"Law for Youth," a 28-page illustrated booklet published by the Board of Supervisors for the Department of Community Services, has met with excellent response from schools and organizations serving young people, supervisor Burton W. Chace said.

Los Angeles City Schools have requested 50,000 copies for classroom use in junior high schools. Large quantities have been requested also by District PTA's, Los Angeles Police Department, Los Angeles County Schools and other organizations.

Chace said material in the booklet is presented in an understandable manner for young people and parents. It provides a brief description of laws applying in all cities and unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County.

Welfare Rolls Up More Than 50 Per Cent

Welfare expenditures have more than doubled in the state of California during the past five years, while population has shown an increase of only slightly more than 18 per cent.

Taxpayers were contributing to the support of 327,884 recipients of welfare programs in Los Angeles County according to a survey made in December 1964 by the California Taxpayers Assn.

This figure marks an increase of 48.1 per cent in the welfare rolls since December, 1959 when a similar survey numbered 221,434 recipients. Statewide there has been an increase of 49.2 per cent, with 913,654 persons receiving state aid in December, 1964 and 612,501 in December of 1959.

Population throughout the state increased by only 18.4 per cent in the period from the 1960 census to Jan. 1, 1965.

THE 1964 RELIEF roll consisted of 270,678 recipients of old age security, 12,357 receiving blind aid, 55,232 on the aid to the needy disabled, 532,987 children and adults on the aid to families with dependent children program, and 42,400 receiving general home relief.

Welfare costs for 1964-65 as estimated in the governor's budget, excluding about \$25 million in county-financed general relief, will

reach \$1,008,720,870 by the time the year ends next June 30. This is comparable to costs for 1959-60 totaling \$501,313,470. Thus, in the five-year period during which population increased by a little over 18 per cent, welfare expenditures more than doubled.

"Mounting welfare spending certainly is one of the reasons the legislature now faces proposals for the levy of new taxes and sharp increases in existing levies," stated S. J. Arnold, the association's executive director.

"The immense liberality shown by California in recent years gives clear evidence that a moratorium is essential in further liberalization of our welfare laws.

"We all feel concern for the plight of the needy, but we must not forget the welfare of the self-reliant individual who struggles to care for himself as well. As we overburden the taxpayer we push additional numbers of our people toward dependence on public charity. This is a good time to change our direction," Arnold concluded.

Tutoring Plan Set At South

Members of the South High chapter of the California Scholarship Federation are now offering tutoring to students having difficulty with their classroom work.

The program, according to Haig M. Marashlian, assistant principal for instruction, has proven very successful. More than 100 students have used the tutorial services.

Michael Cruikshank, president of the CSF chapter, and Barry Ratih, chairman of the tutoring program, said junior and senior members of the group have devoted their own time to help students having difficulty.

John Gerhardt has been named chairman for the spring semester and is now organizing the spring tutoring service.

Purpose of the meeting is to discuss possible opening of an identification center where youngsters involved in accidents could receive prompt medical attention.


