IMPROVED SERVICE—

A \$500,000 addition to Pacific Telephone's central office at 1307 Creaves Ave., Torrance, will bring that company's total investment in the Torrance exchange to nearly \$9 million in 1965, according to local manager Jim Leggett. This represents an investment of about \$685 per main telephone, or \$420 per telephone, including extensions.

Construction on the new building addition is expected to be completed in August. Completion of the installation of additional electromagnetic switching equipment is expected by December, 1965, or January, 1966. The addition, to adjoin the southwest portion of the existing two story structure, will be two stories with a basement. It is designed to house new switching equipment sufficient to serve the growing needs of the community until 1967, and provides enough space for the installation of additional equipment to serve the Torrance exchange until 1980.
