Four local women represented the Torrance League of Women Voters at the 41st Convention of the California League of Women Voters in session in San Diego. They were Mrs. Louis Lanzer, Torrance League president, Mrs. C. R. Berwanger, Mrs. Don Finkelstein, and Mrs. Norman Greenman.

Delegates brought together the thinking of 13,500 members in 70 Leagues throughout the state following two years of study on the California Legislature.

Formulation of a new state governmental study topic was the main business of the convention, according to Mrs. Lanzer. She pointed out that selection of a study item involves direct League member participation, with each delegation expressing the preferences of its local group.

An unusual fashion show added a light touch to the first evening of the convention as one delegate from each League modeled a costume representing her community.

Dr. Bernard L. Hyink, vice president for Academic Affairs and professor of Political Science at California State College at Fullerton spoke to the delegates at a Wednesday evening banquet. His topic was "The Challenge to California."
