Transparent Hive Shows Secrets of Honey Bees

What goes on inside a bee hive?

Three Carson area youngsters are learning answers to that question by observing honey bees at work inside a unique bee hive.

The youngsters — Brenda, David and Joe Tanner — are observing the daily work and life of the honey bees in a glass hive. The hive is located between the walls of the Tanner garage.

It all began when David, 11, and Joe, 13, discovered a swarm of bees had established their home in the garage wall, using a convenient knothole for the front door. Joe and David, curious about their new neighbors, moved in a little too close and found out that bee stings can be painful.

At that point, a neighbor came into the picture. "Andy"

Cochran, a Torrance barber and former bee keeper, carefully cut out a square of the paneling on the inside of the garage and replaced with transparent plastic. The youngsters are now able to sit in comfort inside the garage and observe the workings of the bee hive.

Cochran had helped the trio to understand what is happening with some impromptu lessons in the garage.

Cochran plans to enclose other areas of the garage with transparent plastic and smoke the bees out of the original section in order to get the honey.

Dream Comes True For Madison Class

A dream which began for a Torrance fifth and sixth grade class last autumn came true this past week when a banana boat docked in Wilmington.

Students in Miss Carol Andersen's class at Madison School had been keeping their collective fingers crossed ever since they "adopted" a freight ship six months ago—hoping it would alter its New York to Jamaica route and drop anchor in Los Angeles Harbor.

The possibility seemed remote; but in their correspondence with Capt. Everett Newcomb of the S. S. Limon, a United Fruit Co. ship, the students voiced their hope that someday they could board the ship and meet the captain.

So said letters to the West Indies, letters to the Panama Canal Zone, and letters to other ports in the Caribbean. And so said letters to the home office in New York.

The students finally boarded the ship, S. S. Limon, last Monday. It had been ordered to deliver its cargo of Jama-

ican bananas to Los Angeles and San Francisco.

A welcoming committee—the entire class—was standing on the dock when the big ship steamed into port Monday. Their six-months correspondence with the ship's captain and crew ended when they boarded the ship for a tour.

When the class returned to Torrance, their dream a reality, they carried vivid reminders of the visit, for Capt. Newcomb had given each of the students a large bunch of bananas.

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
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
