

Text From Proverbs Is Subject

Assurance of God's care for all is offered in the Bible lesson entitled "God the Preserver of Man" which will be heard at Christian Science churches today.

Bible readings include these verses from Psalms: "The Lord is night unto all them that call upon him, to all that call upon him in truth... The Lord preserveth all them that love him."

A correlative passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy will also be included: "Dost thou love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind?"

This command includes much, even the surrender of all merely material sensation, affection, and worship." The Golden Text is from Proverbs 29:25: "Whoso putteth his trust in the Lord shall be safe."
