(Continued from Page 1) quate for the projected 300 to 400 students.

A one-year delay in the opening of the college was avoided when the State Legislature authorized a \$50,000 instructional budget at its recent session. The state college system has released \$135,000 for equipment.

Classes will be taught by a 13-man faculty which has served as the college planning staff. Freshman courses will include biology, chemistry, mathematics, physics, economics, geography, history, political science, psychology, English, literature, and music.

APPLICATIONS for enrollment are being accepted by the college from students who meet admission qualifications. Of 67 applications received to date, 34 students have qualified, Dr. Cain said.

"We are a going operation, not something to just talk about," Dr. Cain said.

Students will have access to a 50,000 volume library at the temporary facilities and all equipment necessary for instruction will be available. No on-campus living facilities will be available during the first year.

Dr. Cain said the college will be located in rented quarters for at least two years, but he emphasized the facilities will remain in the area. He also said plans are being made now for relocating the college facilities in 1968.

PROJECTED enrollment of 16,000 full-time students is anticipated within 15 years, Dr. Cain said. He noted the college area—generally the area south of Slauson Avenue and west of the Harbor Freeway—produces 9 per cent of all high school graduates in the state.

Four classrooms, a seminar room, and a library, in addition to business offices, are located in the California Federal Savings building.

Discussing the location problems which have faced the infant college, Dr. Cain said he was hopeful that an adequate site could be found as quickly as possible. "The choices are limited," he said, "if a site can be found, the important thing is to get that site and get things going."

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Colonel Keefer Named Commander of AF Base

Col. William E. Keefer, a Torrance High School graduate, has been named base commander at Westover Air Force Base at Chicopee, Mass., moving to the new assignment from his post as director of plans at 8th Air Force Headquarters.

Colonel Keefer, son of Mrs. John Keefer, 2259 Torrance Blvd., is a native Californian and was graduated from Torrance High School before attending Compton Junior College.

The officer joined the Air Force in 1941 and was commissioned in 1942 after completing aviation cadet training. He then trained as pilot on the B-24 Liberator and saw duty in England, flying 25 combat missions before returning to the United States in mid-1943.

HE WAS assigned to the Air Force installation at Clovis, N.M., and helped activate the 455th Bomb Group and went back to Italy with the unit late in 1943. He flew an additional 35 missions with this unit as squadron commander and director of operations.

Colonel Keefer served as executive officer to deputy commander of the USAF, Lt. Gen. Ira C. Eaker, until 1947 and then spent two years at

the University of Southern California where he studied industrial management.

Later assignments with the Air Force include a tour at Castle AFB and March AFB in California, McConnell AFB in Kansas; and Biggs AFB in Texas. He was the first director of operations for SAC's 3rd Air Division Guam in 1957 and in 1958 was named deputy division commander.

HE THEN was assigned to the Strategic Air Command headquarters at Offutt AFB in Nebraska before his assignment with the 8th Air Force.

Colonel Keefer has logged more than 3,600 hours in such aircraft as the B-36, B-47, B-50, and KC-97, and wears the Distinguished Flying Cross with two Oak Leaf Clusters, the Air Medal with seven Oak Leaf Clusters, the Air Force Commendation Medal, and the Croix de Guerre with Palm.

He and Mrs. Keefer have two children, Karen Lynn, 19, and William E. Jr., 18.

Music will be provided by John Leverett, minister of music at Harbor church, with singing by the Higgins Sisters and the Harbor Trio. The public is invited.

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
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
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
