

Broad Topics Assigned Assembly Interim Groups

 Major streamlining of the Assembly interim work is the purpose of a new procedure just put into effect by the Assembly Rules Committee. The plan is intended to reduce the enormous number of bills and resolutions assigned to interim study to manageable proportions.

Instead of actually parceling out the 1,700 measures ordered to interim study to the 23 committees, which means that each must be considered individually, the new procedure calls for the assignment of broad subjects to the groups. As a result of the Rules Committee's preliminary work, this pile of measures has been reduced to 129 topics, which fully cover the broad spectrum of our legislative work.

According to the Rules chairman, "when the committee surveyed this pile of bills and resolutions the conclusion was inescapable that rational assignment of this volume of material could not be made nor could any committee be expected to cope with the volume it would receive."

IT WAS FELT that to focus on issues and problems, rather than on bills and resolutions, could be the first step toward development of omnibus legislation in the various fields. It is hoped that the system will encourage the committees to come up with full solutions to major problems, and to draft committee legislation incorporating such solutions. The procedure could help to reduce the number of bills drastically, thus freeing the full Assembly for more thorough consideration of major policy issues.

The new program was adopted with support from the leadership of both parties in the Assembly. It is not in-

tended to disturb the restrictions of the State Constitution and the tradition of the Legislature that each member has full control over his own measures. Each will still have the existing rights and privileges to introduce and work for the enactment of any legislation he desires. However, under the new system, his proposals can be absorbed in omnibus committee bills, or rejected as duplicates of provisions already accepted.

AS EXAMPLES of how the procedure will operate during the interim before the 1967 general session, the topics assigned to some of the major committees will serve. Instead of the scores of bills and resolutions on farm problems,

the Agriculture Committee has been given six major subjects to study: farm labor, milk, commodity standards, marketing, farm land, and pest and disease control. The Committee on Criminal Procedure will operate in these areas; crime, narcotics, prevention and treatment of juvenile delinquency, state pre-emption in control of of-

fenses, legal protection of impoverished offenders, status and authority of police officers, and curbing obscenity by enforcement of existing law. THE EDUCATION Committee will divide problems in that important area into five classifications. Its subjects include higher education, teach-

er qualifications and recruiting, public school efficiency, curricula and grading, and the organization and administration of education. The Finance and Insurance group will delve into unemployment and disability insurance, workmen's compensation, auto liability, fire and health insurance and trading stamps.
