Minister To Serve In Ohio

Appointment of the Rev. Jimmie Gene Walker as associate pastor of the First Methodist Church of Xenia, Ohio, has been announced by Bishop Francis Gerald Enstey.

Mr. Walker is the son of retired Bn. Chief of the Torrance Fire Department Eugene K. Walker and Mrs. Walker.

Born in Tennessee, the associate pastor was graduated from Torrance High School. He was active in the local Methodist Church and served in various capacities as a youth leader. In 1955 he was named MYF'er of the year for the First Methodist Church. Mr. Walker was active on the Southern California - Arizona Council and twice represented the area at the National Conference of Methodist Youth: North Carolina, 1956 and Indiana, 1958.

Following graduation from El Camino College, the young minister attended California Western University, San Diego and holds a BA degree. He was named to appear in the 1960 edition of Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities. In June of this year he was granted a BA degree from the Methodist Theological School, Delaware, Ohio.

Prior to his present assignment, Mr. Walker served as associate pastor of the Starford St. Paul's Methodist Church, Delaware, Ohio, and as pastor of the Warrensburg Methodist Church.

ROME - So much has happened since my last article was written. Our around-the-world tour ended in Athens and I sent the tour members in four different planes to four different places. It was rather sad parting for us—the group was an exceptionally warm and friendly one and we truly enjoyed each other's company. Some groups are murder — people sometimes find it difficult to get along under close circumstances, and parting under those conditions is most welcome.

Am writing this while sitting on the steps of the historic Santa Maria Maggiore Basilica in Rome. It's much more interesting to sit and enjoy the busy pattern of life in Rome, than to sit in a hotel room and try to be inspired. Most of the places we have visited have been the fourth or fifth time for me—and just as exciting now as the first time.

Charles Shields, a student of mine from El Camino, met me in Rome with his new Volkswagen camper. We went to the new Leonardo da Vinci airport and waited for my wife, whose plane from Los Angeles was six hours late. What a welcome sight we were after her hectic and stormy crossing.

THE SISTINE CHAPEL, St. Peter's, the Pantheon, the Roman Forum, and the Baths of Caracalla were only a few of the places we visited. Luckily, we were able to see "Aida" at the Baths of Caracalla. Camels, horses, hundreds of people on the stage, exceptional singing — all went in the making of a wonderful evening.

After three and one-half hours of watching "Aida" — we were famished. Rome closes up around midnight, so it was just luck that we found an American snack bar open in the Piazza di Barberini. After practically starving on the Italian "fixed price" meals — we stuffed ourselves with familiar American food. The main curse of my "fixed meal" that day was two succini squash (small) stuffed with a pinch of meat.

What a disturbing place Rome can be — until you get used to it. The traffic is unreasonable but people seem to avoid getting hit. The taxi drivers still manage to gouge the American tourist — but it looks as though the tourists

Storm Drain Bond Sale Authorized

Sale of \$40 million in storm drain bond funds has been authorized by county supervisors; Sept. 21 has been set for opening of bids.

The action, recommended by Flood Control Chief Engineer Walter J. Wood, will provide for construction of vital flood control projects through the fall of 1966, according to Chairman Burton Chace.

Of the total, \$30 million represents funds from the 1958 bond program of \$225 million to finance 184 projects. It is the 13th sale of bonds with 165 million previously purchased.

CHACE SAID that 141 projects totaling 312 miles of drainage facilities have been completed under the program. There are 30 projects — nearly 82 miles in length — under construction, with 13 projects totaling 34 miles yet to be built.

In addition, construction savings on the program will permit the district to spend \$24 million on another 39 "supplemental" drains. These were included in the bond issue, but could only be funded out of savings on regular projects.

THE REMAINING \$10 million in bond funds to be sold Sept. 21 are under the program voted last November. It is the second sale from the \$275 million authorized, with \$15 million sold previously.

These funds will finance construction through spring of next year. Under the 1964 program, 267 drains totaling 493 miles will be built. The initial project is under construction in Redondo Beach and additional jobs are expected to go to bid within the next few weeks.
