Scout Camps to Bring Outdoors to 600 Girls

The South Bay Council of Girl Scouts will hold three established camps this summer with 200 girls at each session. All girls of fourth grade level and above are eligible. Girl Scout membership is not a requirement.

Big Bear Lake Camp will be in session from June 28 through July 9, and July 9 through July 18; while the de Benneville Pines Camp in Barton Flats will be held Aug. 9 through 20.

Registration is now open on a first-come, first served basis. For information on registering for camp, call the South Bay Council office, FR 4-6735 or FR 4-6933.

Campers may apply for more than one session. Transportation by bus is provided from the Morris Scout House in Redondo Beach.

THE CAMP fee includes all living expenses plus transportation, program activities and instruction. Camp scholarships are available to assist girls in paying the camp fee.

Waterfront activities both at Big Bear and Jenks Lakes include canoeing, boating and swimming, outdoor adventures in nature, conservation and a primitive campout on a backpacking trip.

Sports include archery, volleyball and swimming as both sites have large pools.

For qualified Cadettes, a canoe exploration trip is a special adventure at Big Bear Camp, while an overnight backpack on Mount San Geronimo is offered at de Benneville Pines. An overnight trail ride is scheduled for qualified riders at de Benneville, an added attraction for horse lovers.

The smell and crackling of a campfire at dusk with a sky full of stars overhead and a congenial group of girls, singing and acting out skits should be a part of every girls' experience; a nostalgic memory to be brought to mind many years hence.

Would You Do This for Yours?

What kind of man would you choose for a husband if you knew the final choice would mean relinquishing your citizenship and your religion, that any children you would have must be declared illegitimate, and that perhaps you must even move from your country altogether? All for one man.

Would you insist, then, for all of this self-sacrificing that your husband be tall, dark, handsome, brilliant, fashionable, gallant, exciting, rich, etc., etc.?

Or would you be even remotely satisfied with a man years older than you, short and quite a bit on the fat side, balding and certainly not possessing one iota of the "romantic hero" in his personal appearance?

Beautiful Sophia Loren did just that. Her story of trying to legalize in Italy her marriage to Carlo Ponti (originally performed in Mexico)

has been front-page news for years. She could have decided to just give up and start over, as do so many Hollywood women. But that she didn't proves an interesting point. Let's analyze just what that point is and why Sophia still wants Carlo, despite all the trials and tribulations.

SOPHIA LOVES CARLO! In her own way, in her own thoughts, Carlo is her knight in shining armor. She says he is brilliant, understanding, patient, and the greatest man in the world.

Perhaps he is. But even if he hadn't been all these things before he married Sophia, he would find himself inspired now to try to be all she claims.

Think of your beast as a sort of voodoo doll. You stick needles and pins of discouragement in him, and he wilts away to nothingness.

But if, like Sophia, you become a sculptor of man, you

mold and shape, create the image and exhibit your handiwork proudly, your work comes to life.

Every man is like a work of art. Some artists paint with great realism, projecting the subject true to life. Others may paint a man in abstract, while still others envision him as "far out." Whatever the depiction, the final result is what the artist claims to see in that man.

Like Sophia, then, your Carlo does not necessarily have to look like a matinee idol in physical appearance, but he can be your dreamboat, simply because that's how you envision him.

Now then, after all this, take another look at your beast. As an artist who is full of imagination, charm, wit, understanding, love and affection, how do you see your subject? Would you give up everything to hang on to him?

City Budget For Lomita Due June 6

A preliminary budget for the city of Lomita for the fiscal year beginning next July 1 will be presented to the City Council at a special study session on June 1, it was reported yesterday by City Administrator Stanley Greene.

Public hearings on the budget have been scheduled at a meeting to be held at 7 p.m. at the Lomita Recreation Center on June 6. Adoption is anticipated at the regular meeting of the City Council on June 13, Greene said.

The 1966-67 budget will be the third presented for the city which is balanced, provides for an adequate surplus, and imposes no city property tax, it was reported.
