'Freeway Driving' Topic For Hospital Auxiliary

"Freeway Driving Tactics," a film, will be shown by Emmett G. Lindquist; and also slides and a talk on "Reconstruction Surgery for Facial Injuries Due to Automobile Accidents" will be given by John E. Williams, M.D. at the Little Company of Mary Hospital Auxiliary meeting on Wednesday, June 8 at 8 p.m. in the doctors' dining room of the hospital in Torrance.

Mr. Lindquist is safety consultant for the Automobile Club of Southern California and has been with that organization since 1947. The film, which was produced by Charles Cahill & Associates, gives freeway pointers advocated by experts. These include entrances, lane changes, major emphasis on the dangers of following closely, reaction time, what to do in emergency. It combines live action vignettes, animation, viewer self-test sequence and a staged collision to illustrate reaction time.

Dr. Williams of Inglewood, a plastic surgeon who specializes in reconstructive surgery, will show slides of actual case histories demonstrating what can be done to help people disfigured by collisions.


