Mrs. Phil MacBride, International Affairs Chairman of the Redondo Beach Dianas Junior Women's Club, has acquired over 20 reams of stationery, envelopes, ledger paper, business cards and scrap paper to contribute to the Redondo Beach Sister City program.

Stan Vaughan, Redondo Beach Sister City Chairman, states that the supplies will be sent to "Boys Town" in LaPaz. The school has been in operation for 15 years and is run by Father Toncini. It consists of 60 to 65 orphans, ages 9 to 14.

The school is supported almost solely by the Americans. They do all of their own printing, mechanics, shoe making and even build their own buildings.

The Dianas are affiliated with the California Federation of Women's Clubs, Marina District, Junior Membership.
