Let's go on an African Safari. Don't gasp and remark that the price is prohibitive. You can now enjoy the wonders of Africa on a 22-day travel bargain for only \$1,495. The glories of ancient Egypt come alive for you—the Pyramids, Sphinx, King Tut's Museum, and much more. Emperor Haile Selassie still rules Ethiopia, one of Africa's best sight-seeing countries. East and Central Africa, with thousands of wild animals offer an exciting experience.

The scenery is breathtaking—The Victoria Falls in Rhodesia, considered to be one of the Seven Natural Wonders of the world—Lake Victoria in Uganda, where you can take a swim amidst the beauties of nature—Mt. Kenya, and William Holden's famous Treetops Hotel in Nairobi, with the wild animals just below, drinking water and licking salt.

If 22 days is not enough, how about a 58-day tour for \$2,595. That includes all the best in East Africa, South Africa, and West Africa, with excellent hotels, superb meals, good roads and modern cars, buses and trains. SCANDINAVIA has always been a kind of Fairy Tale Land for most people. Not as many people go there as do to Europe. American tourists usually go just to Copenhagen on the last leg of a European tour—this is alright, but one must spend at least 22 days in Scandinavia to really see it.

Just happen to know of a 22-day traditional tour of Scandinavia that includes Norway, Sweden, and Denmark for only \$995. The Norway portion includes Stavanger and Bergen, the famous seaport of Norway. Ulnik with its beautiful scenery,

snow capped peaks, and the capital, still retains the atmosphere of the days of the Vikings. Sight-seeing there includes Frogner Park, the Viking ships, Kon Tiki Raft, and the unique City Hall.

This tour includes a Fairy-tale tour of Denmark that ends in Odense, birthplace of Hans Christian Andersen. There is a museum there that still houses many of his personal things. Copenhagen, the "Paris of the North," is a rare delight for all tourists. So much to see there—but my favorite place is still Tivoli Gardens, where the Danes go for fun. The important stops in Sweden are Gothenburg and Stockholm. A highlight is riding through the canals of Stockholm that have caused it to be called "The Venice of the North." Next tour leaves on July 11.

AROUND THE ORIENT can be very interesting. How about a 22-day tour of the Far East for only \$1,485? This tour includes Korea, Japan, Taiwan, Philippines, Hong Kong, Macao, Cambodia, Thailand, Malaysia, Singapore, and Hawaii. So many countries to visit and so many unique places to see, that it is impossible to even talk about more than one or two.

My favorite place on this tour would be Hong Kong. I've written much about it before in this column but it is such a fascinating city that one can never really say all that he feels about Hong Kong. The food naturally is exotic and spicy—which I like. The shopping is really fun—because goods come here from all over the world (a great deal from the United States) and there are buyers from all over the world. It's "carnival time" all of the time. Next tour leaves June 25.

New Junior High Given Famous Aviator's Name

Glenn Hammond Curtiss has been approved by the L.A. Board of Education as the name for a new \$3,000,000 junior high school scheduled for construction in the Dominguez area.

The name, originally nominated by a citizens committee and recommended by Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther, was approved

unanimously. The new school will be located on a 22.7-acre site 300 feet west of Central Avenue and 500 feet south of Turmont Street.

The site is close to the location where the "First United States Air Meet" was held in January, 1910. The area was then known as Dominguez Field.

Glenn Hammond Curtiss, American aviation pioneer and inventor, was active in California and took part in the famous Dominguez air show.

Facilities at the school will include a classroom building, library, gymnasium, physical education fields, administrative offices and shops.


