

Montgomery Hunts For Replacements

In nine days of spring football practice, Coach George Swade of Bishop Montgomery High School was at least able to learn the names of his prospects for the 1966 season. Some of the boys were around before, so Coach Swade was able to skip their introductions.

In spite of having a number of lettermen back, Coach Swade faces the problem of replacing seven key positions. Gone are all-league ends Tom Hanson and Mike Leamy, tackle Mike Woods, guards Bill Kristufek, Dan Gillespie, and linebacker Pete Trocchiano.

Four varsity positions appear to be in good hands at this point. Danny Graham will again direct the Knights' offense at quarterback, Chuck Bongard will be the I-back, Mike McClain returns to a first string tackle position,

and Patrick Kealey, a junior is at center.

"We won't know too much about every position until the kids put the pads on," said Swade. Who will play the guard position is strictly a toss up, explained the coach.

With McClain at left tackle, Swade will probably team him with Mark Leamy who started a couple games at right tackle a year ago.

Since Montgomery has relied on Graham's passing for two years, Swade has another tough chore finding a couple ends to match departed Mike Leamy and Tom

Hanson. The most notable lack of depth is the end position.

The right halfback and fullback spots are held by Bob Comstock and Ed Gilles who were inactivated last year with injuries.

In order to bolster the backfield, all regulars will learn multiple positions. Among them is Danny Pritchett who plays behind Graham at quarterback.

A tough non-league schedule has been arranged. The opener is with Mira Costa High, a Bay League member. Lennox and Lawndale of the Pioneer League and Verbum Dei of the Angelus League have also been scheduled.

Among championship contenders for the Camino Real League are St. Bernard's, Crespi and Fermin Lasuen. Bishop Montgomery's only loss of the '65 campaign was 14-7 to Crespi for the league title.

More Rams Sign for '66 Season

Three veteran offensive linemen and two kickers have signed 1966 contracts with the Los Angeles Rams.

Guards Don Chuy and co-captain Joe Scibelli and tackle Charlie Cowan, all offensive starters in '65 have inked pacts for next year, along with place-kicking specialist Bruce Gossett and punter Jon Kilgore.

It'll be the sixth NFL season for both Cowan and Scibelli and the fourth for Chuy. Last year Cowan moved from guard to right tackle, replacing captain Frank Varrichione, who retired at the end of the year. The former New Mexico Highlands backfield star adapted quickly to the new position, and at 6-4, 270, should be ready for an outstanding year.

Scibelli, recently named offensive co-captain along with tight end Marlin McKeever by coach George Allen, has been steadily improving since the climax of the 1963 season and is rated a top blocker on sweeps. Chuy, from Clemson, took over the left guard spot in '65 and held it throughout.

Gossett has had two fine seasons as the Rams' No. 1 place kicker. Last season he led the club in scoring for the second straight time, hitting on 15 of 26 field goal attempts and 30 of 32 PATs for 75 points. He also kicked a 49-yard field goal, a personal record for him and the fourth longest in Ram history. Kilgore, from Auburn, took over the punting chores at mid-season when the club released Billy Lothridge.

Expansion Eyed for Air Races

Rick Townsend, president of Air Races, Inc., said the circuit would include Lancaster on the West Coast, one near Tokyo and another near London.


Laker Rookies Drill At Loyola University
