

Little League, Senior Playoffs Set

Little League and Senior Division tournament playoffs have been scheduled for Torrance and Carson this summer. The California Section 6 playoffs will be at Tordondo Little League Field and the Senior Division sectionals will be at the newly-constructed Carson Field.

State Director Edward F. Martins has assigned the Little League Tournament to Henry Burke, District 26 administrator, and the Senior Tournament to Robert Rumbo, District 27 administrator.

Two of the Little League games will be played as subsectional games. On Monday, Aug. 1 a District 29-46 playoff will take place in Norwalk and a 30-55 elimination is slated for Santa Ana.

Following the eight sectional tournaments in the state, a southern division four-team playoff will be held at Granada Hills (Aug. 11-12-13). The northern division will be at Novato, Calif.

The Western Regional Little League championships will be Aug. 18-19-20 at San Lorenzo, Calif.

The World Series is Aug. 23 through 26 at Williamsport, Pennsylvania.

The Senior Division sectional playoffs will be the week of July 25-30 at Carson Field. The Southern Division bracket will be the following weekend at Lennox and the Regionals are Aug. 11-13 at Compton. The World Series will be Aug. 18-20 at DeMoines, Iowa.

Little League district playoffs have also been revealed by the district administrators.

District 27 games will be divided between Harbor City

and Carson Little League. District 26 playoffs are set for Silver Spur and North Redondo Little League.

The championship games for both districts will be played as part of a doubleheader July 30 at Carson Field. Winners of the two districts will be paired in the quarter-final round of the Section 6 playoffs at Tordondo on Tuesday, Aug. 2.

The step was taken in the interest of economy, because the DFG has found in its five years of operating the Chino Game Farm that birds can be purchased for less money than it takes to raise them at Chino.

Aikido Classes Scheduled

A new self-defense class in Aikido will start July 11 at Torrance High School. Aikido is one of Japan's most modern self-defense arts.

Classes sponsored by the Torrance Recreation Department will be held Mondays and Fridays for six weeks from 7 to 9 p.m. Enrollment is \$3.

The program is open to men, women and children 12 years of age and over. Parents enrolled may enroll younger children with the instructor's permission.

The principles of Aikido were discovered by Morihei Ueshiba. This martial art form teaches students to use their minds before they use their bodies. When the art of using your mind is mastered, women and children can defend themselves against a large man.

Instructor Isao Takahashi studied under Professors Ueshiba and Tohei. These men awarded Takahashi his black belt when he mastered the new martial art form.

In 1965, he was awarded his fifth degree black belt by Professor Tohei and now holds the highest rank of anyone in the United States.

Shooting of Sea Lions Illegal in California

A father who wanted his 7-year-old son to learn sportsmanship and the wonders of the sea helped teach a lesson to the captain of a sport-fishing charter boat.

Acting on information supplied by the sportsman, the Department of Fish and Game cited the skipper to appear in the South Bay Judicial Court to answer to a charge of illegal shooting of sea lions. The captain pleaded guilty and was fined \$25.

On May 14 Inglewood resident David B. Hargreaves and his son boarded a charter boat out of a sportfishing landing in Santa Monica Bay. Early in the trip, the boy asked why "the man steering the boat" had a gun. He soon found out. While the anglers aboard the boat were fishing a sea lion pup poked his head up curiously nearby. The skipper promptly took a shot at him.

Later, the captain shot at another sea lion while the boat was under way from one fishing location to another. This time he apparently hit his target; one angler said he saw blood.

Hargreaves didn't see blood, but he did see red. His son could not understand why the sea lions were attacked, and neither could Hargreaves. After the boat returned to shore, he fired off a letter to the DFG's regional office in Los Angeles.

"As a skin diver and fisherman for a number of years," he said, "I have grown rather fond of our old friends the California sea lions. . . I understand they are protected by state law. . . I am trying to teach my son to be a sportsman in the truest sense, not a sadistic murderer of animals. There is a difference."
