

2,700 in 'Learn to Swim' Programs at City Plunge

Over 2,700 7-to-12-year-olds won't have to apologize for being wet behind the ears when the summer program ends at the city plunge. Because, if current registration continues, that's the number of boys and girls who will graduate from the "Learn to Swim Campaign."

This summer swimming lessons are conducted in the mornings, Monday through

Friday at the plunge. Seven other organized swim programs compete for use of the pool in addition to the hours it is open to the public for just cooling off. Organized programs include youth classes, for 13-to-18-year-olds of all swimming abilities; adult classes at all levels; synchronized swim classes; competitive swim team; junior life saving; sen-

ior life saving; and a junior frogman program. With the exception of the synchronized swim classes, new sessions are being formed throughout the summer. Those interested may obtain additional information on any of the programs offered, or hours that the pool is open to the public, by visiting the plunge at 3331 Torrance Blvd., or by calling between

the hours of 9 a.m. and 9:30 p.m. weekdays or 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturdays, or 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Sundays.


