

Disputed Zone Case Due Before Council Tuesday

A three-year controversy about the development of a 100-acre parcel of land at 235th Street and Crenshaw Boulevard may end Tuesday when the City Council holds another public hearing on the matter.

Councilmen will convene at 8 p.m. Tuesday at the City Hall.

The new hearing was ordered two weeks ago when efforts to settle the matter were blocked. Mayor Albert Isen protested the proposed action as "sneaky" and called for another hearing so persons interested in the matter could be heard.

THE LAND is now zoned for manufacturing uses and retention of that zoning has been recommended by the city's Planning Commission.

Developers Dan E. Butcher and Don Wilson—each owns

about half the parcel—have presented plans for developing the area as a cemetery and for residential uses.

A city council committee which studied the proposals for several weeks has recommended a compromise plan calling for a cemetery on the western 50-acres-plus, with entrance and exit on Crenshaw Boulevard, and residential and commercial development on the eastern 50-acres.

AT ISSUE Tuesday will be a motion by David W. Lyman that the compromise plan be adopted. Lyman wants Wilson's half of the property zoned for residential uses, with the zoning to become effective when the owners have reached an agreement to permit development of the cemetery and a conditional use permit has been obtained.

Isen has consistently opposed the cemetery proposal. As a result of his protests, the motion was tabled and a new hearing ordered for this week.

On new piece of information has been added to the matter. The Federal Aviation Agency, in response to letters from the city has recommended retention of the manufacturing zone.

The FAA said it "cannot foresee that any of the proposed developments would seriously or adversely affect the growth or operation of the airport." The FAA also added that residential uses "may generate a considerable volume of complaints about noise and low flying."

Evangelist At El Nido


