Pushaway — First of Four Step Delivery

(This is the 2nd of Seven Articles on Bowling). The first step is taken with the right foot and is the beginning of a closely knit chain of movements leading up to the release. With this first step there must be a coordinate movement of the ball. The ball must be pushed away; that is, pushed out from the body slightly on a downward angle. It cannot be stressed too often that this pushaway must be simultaneous with the movement of the right foot in a smooth, fashion; I caution you not to thrust the ball out, but rather move it gently at the same speed that you take your first step.

Paul Gadbois, the West High runner who was passed up in the early selections for the Lions Allstar Prep Football Game, was added to the squad only a few days before the start of practice Wednesday and may wind up in the starting backfield.

Flaman Coaches Blades

Ferdinand Charles (Ferne) Flaman, 39-year-old veteran of 908 National Hockey League matches, has been named coach and General Manager of the Los Angeles Blades of the Western Hockey League, Executive Director Jack Geyer announced.

Flaman, who started his professional playing career with Hershey of the American Hockey League in 1946 and ended it in 1964 as a playing-coach for Providence of the AHL, coached the Providence team the last two seasons.

A native of Dysart, Sask., Flaman spent 15 years in the NHL, all but four with Boston. He played those seasons with Toronto and was a member of the 1950-51 Maple Leaf Club which won the Stanley Cup championship.

Flaman's first year as a playing-coach came in 1961-62 with Providence. He continued in the dual capacity the following two seasons, before becoming a full-time mentor.

Flaman was named to the NHL All Star team in 1954-55 1956-57 and 1957-58. He had a reputation as a rugged, competent, no-nonsense rear-guard. During his NHL career he spent 1370 minutes in the penalty box and garnered 34 goals with 174 assists.

Under Flaman's hand, Providence won the AHL Eastern Division title in 1962-63.

Flaman and his wife Jeanne have three children, Terry, 18, Lori, 15, and Fernie, Jr., 9.

Flaman succeeds Lynn Patrick, who left the Blades to accept an executive post with St. Louis, one of the NHL expansion teams.

Native Diver Enrolls For Del Mar Campaign

Native Diver, California's all-time stakes-winning champion, will head the formidable public stable of veteran trainer M. E. (Buster) Millerick which will campaign during the 1966 Del Mar thoroughbred racing season beginning Tuesday.

Native Diver, the prize development of Millerick's colorful career and still a brilliant competitor at the age of 7, garnered his 28th stakes victory recently when he became the first horse in history to win the Hollywood Gold Cup twice.

The phenomenally swift Imbros gelding is a favorite of Del Mar racegoers, who are quite familiar with his exploits. A year ago, Native Diver treated his fans to one of his finest performances by

winning the San Diego Handicap for a third time while packing 131 pounds. And, his time of 1:40 flat equalled Windy Sands' track record set in 1962 under 122 pounds.

Native Diver is expected to seek an incredible fourth straight triumph in the San Diego Handicap, which will be renewed Aug. 6 this season, as well as pointing for the \$30,000 added Del Mar Handicap at a mile and one-eighth Sept. 5.

Also in the Millerick string "where the turf meets the surf" will be such high-class horses as Golden Tan Stable's the Shapiros' Azure Te, King Acres Stock Farm's Harry Gilbert, The Klipstein Stable's Mr. Payne and DeCourcy Graham's Let's Hurry.

A few years ago Little League decided to back up the fences from 175 feet to a recommended depth of 200 feet.

Kids are still knocking 'em out of the park with regularity, but at least nowadays the outfielders have something to do.

The first couple days of the Little League tournament produced some walloping home runs and spectacular fielding.

Thursday at Silver Spur Field, the Riviera Little League defense robbed Rolling Hills of three hits, but the Hilltoppers batted out 11 other bingles for a 5-2 District 26 playoff victory.

Tom Bondurant hit a first inning homer for one of his three hits. Riviera went ahead 2-1 in the third on a single by Mike Anderson and a sacrifice fly by Hugh Morris.

Lee Handley of Rolling Hills came right back in the fourth with a first pitch home run off Steve Jarvis. Tom Papadakis hit a ball to right center that Joe Martinez deflected to keep the ball in the park for a double. Papadakis later scored on a single by Scott Sanders.

Rolling Hills added two insurance runs in the sixth.

In Tuesday's District 26 opener at North Redondo, Scooter Giddens fanned 12 batters for South Redondo, eliminating Pacific, 3-0.

At Harbor City, site of the early goings for District 27, Torrance National and North Torrance West battled for eight and a third innings before West cashed in the winning run, 1-0, as Mike Lensing singled home Dean Irgens. The game was Wednesday.

The following evening defending district champion Torrance American was beaten by Dominguez, 4-1.

Dominguez led, 1-0, going into the top of the sixth. When Dominguez got a man aboard to open the inning, Mike Sober, came in to pitch in relief for American. Before he got very far Bill Powell slammed a three-run homer to ice the game. The losers got their only run in the bottom of the sixth.

North Torrance East came up with a pair of five-run rallies in the first and fifth innings for a 10-1 win over Victoria Park. Mike Russell hit a three-run homer in the fifth.

Playing their first game District 27 yesterday were Lomita and Fre-Way. Tomorrow's pairing at Harbor City is Dominguez versus Pacific Coast and the first game at Carson Field pits North Torrance West against Carson.

On Tuesday North Torrance East grapples Central Torrance at Carson and the Lomita-Fre-Way winner is entertained by Harbor City.

The semi-finals and finals are Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday at Carson.

The District 26 bracket picked up momentum yesterday with Southwood opposing host North Redondo, Central Redondo against Sunset, Lunada Bay against Malaga Cove, and Silver Spur against Eastview.

Torrando, which drew a bye, meets South Redondo Monday at North Redondo, and likewise Palos Verdes sees action for the first time against Rolling Hills at Silver Spur.

Yesterday's winners at each field play each other Tuesday and the semi-finals are Wednesday and Thursday.

Saturday's championship game is part of a District 26-27 doubleheader at Carson Field.
