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GOP Women Hear Speech by Newsman

Walter L. Scratch, political editor of the Santa Monica Evening Outlook, will discuss "A Newsman's Role in Politics" at a noon luncheon meeting of the South Bay Club of Federated Republican Women Thursday, Aug. 11, at Smith Brothers Indian Village.

Scratch has been covering political campaigns and conventions as well as numerous governmental activities ever since his graduation from the University of Michigan in 1926. He also investigated Communist activities in California during the late 1940s and wrote a book entitled "God vs. Communism" which carried a jacket endorsement by former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Before joining the Evening Outlook five years ago, Scratch was assistant to the publisher of a Hollywood newspaper for 17 years. Previously he served as Sunday editor of the Oakland Tribune and as city editor of the Star-Bulletin in Honolulu. Scratch and his wife Patty, whose paintings have been widely exhibited in California, have been Hollywood residents since 1944. All Republican women are invited to attend.

Graduation Set

Twenty-one members of Harbor College's Professional Nursing Class of 1966 will end their college-in-hospital training and their first hurdle to becoming registered nurses on Friday, Aug. 12 at ceremonies in the Student Seahawk Center, 111 Figueroa Place, Wilmington.

Traditional "pinning" will climax graduation services beginning at 8 p.m. A reception will follow.

This will be the second Registered Nurses Training Class since Harbor inaugurated its nurses training program, originally for vocational nurses only.

Graduation speaker will be Mrs. Marie Ryan Petro, director of Nursing Services, Gardena Hospital.

Before the graduates may carry the "R.N." after their names, they must pass a California State Board examination. However, they may be employed at Harbor General Hospital, Los Angeles General, and other county hospitals as student graduate nurses.

In addition to their campus class work, members of the class worked in Harbor General Hospital, Kaiser Foundation Hospital, Lomita and San Pedro Community Hospitals.
