New Courses Planned When ECC Math Building Opens

Metallurgy will be among several new courses to be offered in El Camino College's new mathematics and engineering building, upon its completion in 1968, according to Dr. G. Theodore Elmgren Jr., coordinator of industry and technology.

"Need for the study of metallurgy has been greatly augmented by the growth of the space age. There is a great demand for metallurgical technicians and engineers," Elmgren explained.

The curriculum, which will be expanded, is presently being held in two buildings: Technical Arts for lecture courses and Physics for lab work.

"A new lab course, which is being planned, is heat treating, which will cover ways of treating, hardening, and work."

Army Pvt. Paul M. Hoy, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orville D. Hoy, 23217 Hubert Ave., completed a field communication crewman course at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo. Oct. 6.

During the course, he was trained to string wire from the field to the communication center. Instruction was also given in basic electricity, switchboard installation and operation and pole climbing.

Marine Pvt. I.C. Daniel Addington, son of Mrs. Ellen Addington of 21934 Ocean Ave., is serving with Headquarters Battery in the 11th Marine Regiment, First Marine Division at Chu Lai, Viet Nam.

The regiment engages in artillery support of the Vietnamese infantry, while also conducting civic action programs.

Eight courses in the subject are offered alternately every three semesters. These courses teach the various phases and types of metallurgical technology.

Small is presently developing the course.

The new building will be shared by the Engineering and Mathematics and Industry and Technology divisions.

FACILITIES will include metallurgy and materials testing labs, grinding, polishing, etching, microscope and dark rooms. There will also be a heat treatment lab, furnaces, ovens and salt baths.

An X-ray lab will be used to examine welds in the industrial radiography course. Construction on the new building is tentatively scheduled to begin next year.

College Chief, Trustees Attend Education Meet

El Camino College will be represented by two members of the Board of Trustees, Harry P. McCandless and William Moss Jr., and the president of the college, Dr. Stuart E. Marsee at the 49th annual meeting of the American Council on Higher Education in New Orleans, La., today through Friday.

The purpose of the meeting is to focus on ways of improving college teaching and of reducing the obstructions.

Topics to be discussed include Reformatory General Education, College Teachers: Quantity and Quality, and Evaluation of Teaching Performance.

McCandless, vice president of the Board of Trustees, represents the South Bay area on the board while Moss is the representative of the Torrance area.

- Inglewood, El Segundo and Hawthorne exchanges.
