

Council Delays Action On Civil Service Law

Torrance Councilmen tackled a proposed 72-page civil service ordinance last night but threw it back to the city attorney's office when city employe representatives objected to the presentation of the measure by a Council committee.

Mayor Albert Isen sponsored a resolution calling for the city attorney to meet with employe representatives and correlate the present civil service system to the proposed measure within 120 days.

Dissatisfaction was voiced first by Sam Hunegs, American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employes representative, who called the proposed ordinance a "merit system" imposed by the city through the city manager's office.

HE WAS joined in his criticism by John Kirkpatrick, Torrance City Employes Association representative, who told the Council, "what we have now is functioning."

He said that more time was needed to show how the new ordinance would be an improvement over past proposals and the current ordinance.

Under the new measure, he said, "Hardly any employe of the city could afford to appeal his suspension."

MAYOR ISEN stated that he felt the committee, composed of Councilman Ross Sciarrotta, J. A. Beasley, and former Councilman Ted Olsson, should have shown changes and differences between the existing and the new ordinance.

Sciarrotta defended his

committee's presentation of the report by stating, "Let the council read the white and green ordinances and let them come up with a new ordinance."

He was referring to past ordinances which were prepared on colored paper to distinguish them during discussion.

IN DEVOTING only one hour to review of the proposal, Mayor Isen said, "This council is rubbing on a lamp and asking a genie to come forth and help us out."

City employe representative Kirkpatrick broke the new ordinance down into three parts as related to the current civil service measure.

He said 40 per cent was the same, 20 per cent was not clear in intent, and 40 per cent was designed to give the city increased powers under the merit system.

Under the city attorney's study, employe representatives will be asked to show where the new measure needs to be amended.

IN OTHER business, the council agreed to ask the Planning Commission to make a study of structures on Crenshaw Boulevard between Torrance and Carson boulevards. Mayor Isen said it was necessary to see what kind of development had been done on the boulevard during recent years due to its commercial use.

Concern was raised not for the area's business use but for the kind of structures that are being built.

The city accepted the use of Southern California Edison Company land on Crenshaw Boulevard between 235th Street and Lomita Boulevard for youth baseball play.

The site will be at Edison substation within seven years, but the city will operate the land until that time as a ball park without cost to the city.
