

Civil Defense Siren Test Due Friday

The civil defense sirens of the county and the city of Los Angeles will be sounded in a combined test of the warning systems Friday at 10 a.m., in the customary month-end test, Sheriff Peter J. Pitchess announced today.

As usual, the sirens will be heard in an undulating tone sounded for one minute, in the event of an aerial attack, the undulating tone would be sounded for three to five minutes.

For tests, Pitchess said, it is sounded for only one minute.

An out-of-state travel request was refused by the council upholding an earlier policy of banning long distance traveling on city funds. The specific case involved \$750 needed for a travel request to Vancouver, B.C., for a Public Personnel Conference to be attended by members of the Civil Service Commission.

Councilman George Vico raised a question about a Torrance police cadet who wishes to join the police force but is barred because his brother is in a supervisory position as sergeant. Under city rules, no relative of a city employe is to be hired where nepotism could exist.

However, Mayor Isen spearheaded a drive to repeal all rules governing the civil service rules, which could lead to the cadet's employment. This was meant as a temporary step for this case only.

Third Sun Ray Manor Unit Open

History repeated itself last week end at Ray Watt's Sun Ray Manor.

More than one half million dollars worth of property — 17 homes — was sold in 90 minutes at the opening of the Balanced Power community's third unit, a company spokesman announced.

An identical situation occurred at the opening of the first two units. Those units, comprising 123 homes were sold out within six weeks. The third unit contains 42 homes.

Sun Ray Manor in Wilmington eventually will total 300 homes. Located at 23123 Main St. in Wilmington, the three-, four-, and five-bedroom, one- and two-story homes start at \$23,995.



(Continued from Page 1) "must be made aware of the power of the Redevelopment Agency." Mrs. Riviera said the agency has jurisdiction throughout the city and can exercise powers of eminent domain to acquire real property. "Such an agency should be permitted to function only with the approval of the voters," she added.

The second petition seeks to repeal the city's Uniform Housing Code, which Mrs. Riviera described as a "a law which violates the people's right to privacy."

THE HOUSING code, object of much controversy

earlier this year, was modified by the City Council to permit city inspectors to enter homes only with the approval of the occupant. Specific approval of the council is required when inspectors determine it is necessary to initiate court action in order to inspect a home.

Inspections in a North Torrance area, now some 75 percent complete, have been continuing during the past several months without incident. The housing code program

is required under terms of federal urban renewal programs and is designed to prevent blight from creating the need for further renewal programs, city officials report.

THE WEEKEND drive for signatures will begin at the home of Mrs. Jeannette Altermatt at 1323 Hickory Ave., Mrs. Riviera said.

Under terms of state law governing the petition drive ACT has until Sept. 24 to secure the necessary signatures.

Man's Death Not Result Of Accident

The death of 58-year-old William Bezan July 20 has been classified as due to natural causes, although the man was injured in a major auto accident two days earlier.

The county coroner's office released its findings last Wednesday. Bezan was driving an auto which ran into a parked car at approximately 40 miles per hour.

Bezan, of 3721 W. 180th Place, was taken to Little Company of Mary Hospital after the accident on Artesia Boulevard west of Korbium where he later died. At the time of the auto accident, he was reported in critical condition due to extensive head injuries.

Burglars Break Into Area Plant

Burglars hit Fansteel Metallurgical Corp. for \$28,500 Sunday night in parts, tools and change from vending machines in the plant.

Plant representative Carl Mersheimer reported that approximately 2,000 parts, each valued at about \$13, were taken along with several tool boxes belonging to employees.

Total weight of the parts was estimated at 840 pounds. Police reported that the thieves knew the layout of the plant and entered through a gate and bolted door with the use of keys.
