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# 90 Courses Slated In Evening School

More than 90 courses will be offered to adults this fall by Torrance Unified School District, according to Raymond Collins, principal of Torrance Evening High School. Night classes will be taught at all four high schools; and daytime adult education courses will be conducted at two city parks and the YWCA.

Classes will begin the week of Monday, September 18.

Students who do not wish to receive high school credit may register at the first session of class. Those who desire credit toward a high school diploma are asked to phone the adult education office, FA 8-8000, ext. 295, afternoons, or FA 8-9206 evenings, after Tuesday, September 5, for an appointment to register in advance.

Programs of course offerings will be available at the adult education office, 2200 W. Carson St., or at library branches after September 1. Tuition is \$3 per course per semester for non-credit students. An incidental fee of 50 cents is also collected. Students under 21 or over 65 and those enrolled in English or citizenship classes for the foreign born are not required to pay tuition.

Courses to be offered are as follows:

**North High:** business English, business machines, drafting, dressmaking, electronics, English review, food and pastry arts, general crafts (lapidary, ceramics), basic sewing, U.S. government I, U.S. government II, U.S. history I, U.S. history II, and wood shop.

**South High:** Decorating your home, drawing and painting, dressmaking, electronics (radio and television), food and pastry arts, conversational French, home landscaping, investments and se-

curities, conversational Italian, introduction to aviation (basic ground school), refresher course for pilots, leadership training (effective speaking and good human relations), beginning knitting, intermediate knitting, beginning and intermediate oil painting, advanced oil painting, physical fitness for women, real estate law and sales, beginning conversational Spanish, speed-reading, and typing.

**Torrance High:** Algebra I, astronomy and earth science I, bookkeeping and general records keeping I, beginning carpenter apprenticeship, advanced carpenter apprenticeship, chemistry class, chemistry lab, citizenship for foreign born.

**Dramatics,** drawing and painting, dressmaking, electronics (assembly and design), English for foreign speaking, English review I and II, English review III, English literature and composition, basic first aid, first aid for bus drivers.

**Food preparation,** conversational German, income tax preparation, machine shop, general mathematics, music appreciation and choral training, photography (classroom and darkroom), psychology, modern science, basic sewing, beginning shorthand, brush-up shorthand, speech (public speaking).

**Traffic safety education,** beginning typing, advanced typing, U.S. government I, U.S. government II, U.S. history I, U.S. history II and wood shop.

**West High:** art horizons, bookkeeping and general records keeping, orchestra, physical fitness for women, beginner's shorthand, beginner's typing, sewing and wood shop.

**Daytime classes** will include: Child observation at Walteria and McMasters Parks; cooperative nursery, beginner's knitting and advanced knitting at Walteria Park, and psychology of personality development at the YWCA.

## Torrance Schools Stress English During New Year

Emphasis during the 1967-68 school year will be placed on English, industrial arts, homemaking, art, and the kindergarten curriculum, according to Dr. Albert Pomer, assistant superintendent, instruction.

A revised course of study for fourth, fifth, and sixth grade English students was developed this summer by a committee of teachers who met with members of the instruction staff. Teachers' guides for seventh and eighth grades were formulated last summer. The new English curriculum is being prepared to accompany new state texts which will be introduced throughout California in 1968. Revisions in the kindergarten

handbook prepared by faculty members this summer include new emphasis on language.

Course outlines in homemaking for both elementary and high school students were prepared by a summer committee of homemaking teachers to update the curriculum.

Completion during the summer of the elementary industrial arts guide and framework comes on the heels of a year-long series of meetings between seventh and eighth grade teachers and instruction staff members.
