

Program Set on Library

"On Our Way," a four-day presentation today through Saturday, by the Friends of the Torrance Library at La Casita, Bullock's Fashion Square, will give the public a view of summer accomplishments and a preview of the future of the Torrance Public Library.

Opening today from 12 to 5 p.m., the program will feature book displays, plans for the new central library, a creative stitchery exhibit, and autograph parties with local authors.

Hours Thursday and Saturday will be from 12 to 5 p.m. and Friday the presentation will be from 3 to 8 p.m.

Torrance Unified School District will display books and other audio visual aids for increasing the student's understanding of various subjects. These aids will exemplify the type of material available to teachers in the coming school year.

Also featured will be recent library purchases, which will be available to adults and children when the city assumes control of the Public Library System, according to City Librarian Russell J. West.

Library Commission members and West will attend the program, as well as members of the host group. Arrangements are being directed by Mrs. Robert Denney, program chairman.


