Talk About Pennants

The World Series is certainly one of the year's most enjoyable sports events, regardless of the opponents.

Los Angeles and Orange County would be rocking today if the Dodgers or Angels were involved in the pennant races, but instead the average fan hereabouts sits back to await the final Series pairings. After all, it doesn't take very long to be an authority on the World Series. By the third game a kid who can't even read will be able to recite the entire Cardinal lineup.

Baseball games are very difficult to predict. Not even when Sandy Koufax was at his best were the Dodgers a cinch to win a ball game. The New York Yankees always had trouble beating Detroit.

Almost every World Series that goes beyond five games is won by the team whose "ace" pitcher wins three games.

The St. Louis Cardinals won the pennant two weeks ago because of a tremendous offense. The Cards have always been tough at bat. This year they had the pitching to go with the hitting.

Minnesota got back into the American League chase because of better pitching too. Dean Chance was really a big help.

The team that had no pitching whatsoever a year ago was Boston. The Red Sox still are not too deep in pitching, but they have become a battler. In the pennant drive Boston has been my favorite to reach the World Series.

I believe one of the legends of baseball we were denied a few years ago was the participation of Ted Williams in the World Series. It's been such a long struggle for Boston.

Carl Yastrzemski, the splendid Sox outfielder, is an ideal big league hero. He will pack 'em into Fenwick Park for a long time.

The American League will be tougher next year. It wouldn't surprise me if the Angels, Baltimore Orioles, Cleveland Indians and New York Yankees close the gap between first and eight place.

In the National League it wouldn't be beyond reason for the Dodgers to get back within reach of the "brass ring" again.

Bill Singer and Alan Foster, two great young pitching prospects, will become the No. 1 and No. 2 pitchers on the club. When it comes to talking salary, Don Drysdale is no longer in a position to combine collective bargaining with Sandy Koufax. Nowadays it wouldn't be absurd for Pittsburgh to acquire Drysdale in exchange for Maury Wills.

The Dodgers will make a number of key deals during the winter. It is doubtful anyone would have his feelings hurt if the Dodgers traded Lou Johnson. He is No. 1 bait in my book.

One thing the Dodgers must do "once and for all" next spring is give Willie Crawford a chance to make the varsity.

Willie Davis, Ron Fairly and Al Ferrara would be batting stars in ball parks such as Yankee Stadium or Fenway Park that feature short foul lines. Dodger Stadium is no place to establish record batting averages, except maybe for Roberto Clemente of Pittsburgh. So be satisfied with pitching and defensive games.

The biggest decision facing the Dodgers is what to do about the infield. Right there hinges the success of the team in 1968.

We'll discuss the Angels next.

Racing Scheduled For New Forum

Inglewood's new Forum has scheduled 14 indoor mid-gate auto racing nights beginning Thursday night, Jan. 25.

The disclosure of the only indoor mid-gate auto racing attraction west of the Rockies was made by former Indianapolis champion Johnnie Parsons, newly-appointed director of racing for the Forum.

The 14-date National Mid-gate Racing Association-sanctioned series will encompass a four-month period.

Parsons, who labels the event "a mechanical rodeo like riding in a squirrel cage," expects an opening night field of 45 leading drivers to compete in a nine-race program on difficult one-tenth mile flat cement track.

"Indoor racing has always been an exciting attraction in the past and the Forum schedule of events should ignite enthusiasm in the sport

again," Parsons pointed out. "A similar program ran twice weekly consecutively for 17 years in Oakland before the building was torn down."

The Forum, forthcoming home of the basketball Lakers and hockey Kings, will be officially opened Dec. 30 when the Kings play Philadelphia in a nationally televised NHL game. The Lakers start their Forum schedule the following night against San Diego.

'Player of the Week'

The big tailback for West High—Dave Boyd—earns the title of "player of the week" for his big effort against Hawthorne High Friday night. He averaged better than five yards a carry and scored both touchdowns in West's 15-6 victory over Hawthorne.

Boyd's TD runs were from the 17 and 7-yard lines. Running on a slick field, Dave gained 144 yards in 27 carries. Hawthorne, a good defensive club, keyed its attack against Boyd, but he delivered just the same.

When veteran quarterback Coy Hall returns to action at West, it should further enhance Boyd's running ability. Hall is a confident passer, whose all-around threat will give the opposition more to worry about than Boyd.

Hall broke his hand moving a refrigerator during the summer. Filling in for him have been Len Herscher and Jim Parton, who do a good job of getting the ball to Boyd, but who are less than a serious threat passing.

Boyd was the outstanding player in the Hawthorne game, rebounding from last week's rout of La Puente, in which he sat out the second half with a facial laceration and broken tooth.

Knights Collar Second Victory

The Bay League football gets under way next Friday with a game between Mira Costa and South High. A coach whose team beat both schools by comparable scores said it is impossible to predict a winner.

Following a 27-12 win over Mira Costa last week, Coach George Swade's Bishop Montgomery Knights rebounded with a 20-7 verdict over South Friday night.

Both South and Bishop moved the ball well, even though the field was wet and sluggish. Montgomery went the distance in three of four scoring opportunities while South made in only once in three threats.

Montgomery drove 65 yards for the touchdown after receiving the opening kickoff. Dan Hogan plunged over from the 2 yard line for a 6-0 lead.

The score went to 13-0 in the second period when Quarterback Greg Collins threw to Mike Ramirez for a 37-yard touchdown. Dennis Haren kicked the extra point.

South got on the scoreboard late in the second quarter when Mike Farber scored from the 2-yard line and Jeff Wang raced over for the conversion.

Montgomery got to the 3 yard line late in the third quarter on a 46-yard run by Ramirez. South held on down, could not move the ball itself, and ultimately punted poorly to the 25.

Five plays later Hogan punched over again from the 1 yard line. Haren made it 2 for 3 with a place kick that gave Montgomery the 20-7 margin.

In the second half South took the kickoff and made three first downs to the Montgomery 29. In the final three minutes of the game South got to the Knights' 19 yard line before running out of gas.

For the game the first downs were 14-13 for Montgomery. The total yardage figures were 285 to 211 for the winners.

Ramirez carried 10 times for 112 yards while the elusive Jeff Wang had 88 yards in 22 carries.

Quarterback Walter Scott threw 13 completions in 20 tries for 132 yards passing.

Collins had four completed passes for 56 yards and one touchdown.

Besides the Bay League opener next week between South and Mira Costa, two other games match Redondo against Hawthorne and Santa Monica against Inglewood.

Bishop Montgomery has a non-league outing at home against Lawndale.

An aroused West High football team scored two touchdowns and a safety in the final 14 minutes to hand Hawthorne a 15-6 non-league defeat Friday night at the West campus.

Hawthorne was the first to score. The Cougars held off a series of West drives in the first half and went into intermission with a 0-0 standoff.

The only time Hawthorne crossed the midfield stripe against West was in the third quarter and on the drive Quarterback Pat Mack flipped a 32-yard pass to End Ron Crisp for a touchdown.

After receiving the ensuing kickoff, West set out to knot the score at 6-6. Halfback Dave Boyd, who unleashed 144 yards rushing for the game, went in for the score on a 17-yard trap play.

The go-ahead point try by Phil Johnson was wide.

In the fourth quarter both teams exchanged punts. Jim Parton booted one 60 yards to the Hawthorne 4 yard line. The Cougars finally got caught with a safety trying to punt from the end zone. That gave West an 8-6 lead. West took the kickoff and went 52 yards for another touchdown. Again Boyd

scored on a 7-yard gallop and Johnson's kick was good.

Penalties interrupted a ball control game by West in the first half. The most serious threat got the Warriors as close as the 5-yard line with 4 minutes to go in the half.

The Warriors did not get closer than the 4-yard line. Coach Fred Peterson thought the wet ground hurt his team's offense. He said Hawthorne was bigger in the line and plenty tough. He said the Hawthorne secondary could tackle well.

Beating a Bay League team impressed the coach. Hawthorne goes into league action

next week as host to Redondo.

Boyd, the 207-pound bruiser, came within a yard of last week's 145 yards rushing against La Puente.

San Marino, a 13-7 winner over Rosemead, invades the West Stadium next week for a third non-league contest.

Coy Hall, missing for a month with a broken hand, will don a uniform Monday and begin working out at quarterback. The 183-pound junior was a starter last year.
