State Revenues Increase, But Fall Short of Costs

SACRAMENTO — General fund revenues for the state of California during the first three months of the 1967-68 fiscal year were up 20.7 percent, largely as the result of higher taxes, but they still fell some \$217 million short of matching expenditures.

State Controller Houston I. Flournoy said August and September were the first months to reflect the new revenue program enacted by the legislature July 29.

Revenue sources reflecting the highest increases in cash receipts, as compared to last year, were the inheritance tax, up 101 per cent; bank and corporation tax, up 97 per cent; and cigarette tax, up 90 per cent.

THE 1-CENT increase in sales tax will not show up until later reports. The cigarette tax took another jump of 3 cents per package Oct. 1.

The real big increase, a boost of more than 70 per cent in personal income taxes, will be shown in pre-payments during October and by final payment of taxes next April 15.

The general fund had to borrow another \$3 million

during September, bringing the total for the July-September period to \$201 million. Along with an unpaid debt of \$194 million July 1, the temporary loan balance by Sept. 30 was \$395 million.

MAJOR revenue sources during the July-September quarter included: Sales tax, \$270 million; bank and corporation franchise and income taxes, \$98.5 million; personal income tax, \$17.9 million; cigarette tax, \$36.9 million; and liquor taxes, \$19.8 million.

Major expenditures for the period were: school apportionments, \$246.5 million; University of California, \$55.6 million; old age security, \$37.3 million; aid to families with

dependent children, \$31.9 million; bond interest and redemption, \$52.8 million; health care benefits, \$43.5 million; and aid to disabled, \$18.2 million.
