

Brownies Tasty Treat for Lunch

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In four out of ten homes someone carries a lunch at least every other day. And every other day, mother probably asks, "What shall I pack for those lunches?" A favorite treat is something sweet . . . and your modern gas oven can help you prepare special home-baked treats!

How's your baking IQ? Remember a gas oven does not need to be preheated for most baked foods except for yeast breads and special recipes such as baked Alaska. No preheating saves time and extra steps to the oven. Your kitchen stays cooler because there is no heat when you open the door to place the food inside.

For best results remember these tips when using your gas oven:

- Pull out oven racks to lock position for convenience when placing food in the oven.
- Place pans so they do not touch each other or the sides of the oven. Allow about one inch of space around each pan. Zig-zag the pans on different racks rather than placing them directly above each other. This allows for better circulation of heated air.
- Use light-colored metal pans such as aluminum for best browning. Dark pans may cause uneven or heavy browning.
- Glass is excellent for pastry baking, however if using glass for cakes reduce the oven temperature 25 degrees.
- Homebaked cookies provide a flavor treat that packs quick energy as well as good nutrition. Try these recipes for lunch box desserts or after-school snacks. These cookies can be made ahead and stored in the freezer for 3 to 4 weeks.

RAISIN NUT BARS
2 C. sifted flour

SAUCEPAN BROWNIES
3/4 C. sifted flour
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
2 sq. unsweetened chocolate

Sift together flour, salt, baking powder and soda. Gradually cream sugar into shortening. Add egg to creamed mixture and beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with molasses and milk. Spread in oiled, shallow 8 x 12 inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool on rack. Cut into 1 x 2 inch bars.

1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. soda
1/2 C. sugar
1/4 C. Shortening
1 egg
1/2 C. milk
1/2 C. molasses
1 C. chopped nuts
1 C. chopped seeded raisins

Sift together flour, salt, baking powder and soda. Gradually cream sugar into shortening. Add egg to creamed mixture and beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with molasses and milk. Spread in oiled, shallow 8 x 12 inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool on rack. Cut into 1 x 2 inch bars.

1/4 C. margarine
1 C. sugar
1/2 tsp vanilla
2 eggs
1/2 C. chopped walnuts

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Put chocolate and margarine into 1 1/2 qt. saucepan on Automatic Top Burner and set at 150 degrees to melt. Remove from flame and blend in sugar and vanilla. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition. Stir in sifted dry ingredients. Mix in half of the walnuts. Spread batter in oiled 8 x 8 x 2 inch baking pan. Sprinkle remainder of walnuts on top of batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes. (Top crust will lose its gloss and a very slight imprint will be left when you touch the surface lightly with finger.) Cool on rack for 8 to 10 minutes. Cut into 2 inch squares and remove from pan. Finish cooling on rack.

Retailers New Target In Alcohol Crackdown

SACRAMENTO — Edward J. Kirby, state director of alcoholic beverage control, said the department continues to receive information that some retail licensees are demanding illegal free goods, free services, illegal concessions and rebates from their suppliers as a condition of purchase.

Kirby said such actions on the part of retail licensees, if proven, will not be tolerated and will result in disciplinary action.

Kirby noted that suppliers, their salesmen, or their agents, cannot legally change shelf prices, dust, clean, stock the shelves or perform any other such services for a retailer. This does not interfere with the supplier rotating his own products, Kirby said.

"Where it is established that a retailer solicited or demanded that the supplier engage in illegal activity, an ac-

cusation will be filed against such licensee," Kirby said. "If the supplier initiates the illegal action, the retailer may also incur disciplinary action if he permits such illegal action to occur on his premises."

Under Kirby, the department has been carrying on what has been described as the biggest investigation ever on illegal trade practices. However, despite warnings that a number of major arrests were imminent, none have been made. Four accusations have been filed against licensees, charging the giving of illegal, discounts or free goods.
